SENATOR CUMMINS ATTACKS ALDRICH TARIFF REVISION

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Washington, D. C., May 6.—Warning the senate that if the tariff bill, in its present form, becomes a law conditions will not be remedied and the agitation for revision will not be stilled Senator Cummins, of Iowa, made a sensational address in the upper house today.

"This bill of the senate finance committee will not be accepted by those favoring tariff revision as either a fulfillment of the Republican party's pledge or a settlement of the controversy," declared Cummins. "If the bill, or anything like it, becomes a law, I predict that the campaign for lower duties will continue with increasing zeal until the judgment entered in the court of public conscience is also entered in the journals of congress. It does not give me pleasure to utter this prophecy, for I had earnestly hoped that the revision now in progress would end this dispute for years to come."

Declaring the demand for revision comes from the consumer, he referred to the Republican platform and said:

"The senator who imagines he can satisfy these people by saying revision with higher or substantially the same duties is in compliance with the platform of the party little understands the relation between the people and that platform."

He said that he understood the voices of those desiring to increase the customs now were more plainly heard in the committee room, and dramatically added:

"The time will come when the clamor of the millions who want relief will sound like the roar of a thousand Niagara."

"The people are familiar with the conditions," he continued, "and are aware what industries brood millions. The conclusions of the people are only less infallible than the conclusions of the Almighty himself."

"I have not abandoned my faith in the doctrine of protection, but I am little able to discern its true spirit in this policy."

Dealing with conservation of the forests, Cummins declared that it made little difference whether or not there was a tariff on lumber.

He asserted that the cost of production in a great part of the United States gave Americans an advantage over Canadian lumbermen. He said that duty was only necessary to equalize the difference in the rates of transportation. He also denied that steel needed protection.

A license was procured, the ceremony performed and today Mr. and Mrs. Kemp are established in their own home, and are receiving the congratulations of their amazed friends.
