Ninth Grade Exams—County school superintendents all over the state are now sending out circular papers of information concerning the eighth grade final examination to the respective teachers in each district. Out of the 60 schools in Marion county there are 300 applicants for examination, and each pupil taking the test must average 80, or not below 70, in order to secure a diploma entitling them to enter any school in the state. The district board has appointed 60 teachers to act as examiners.

Hearing on Rates—The Astoria and Columbia River Railroad Company has decided not to have a hearing to the complaint filed with the railroad commission concerning rates over the lines, and today a communication has been received to the effect the company will reduce their passenger tariffs beginning the first of May to the maximum rate of 3 cents per mile. They have several rates, however, less than 3 cents per mile and were also charging 4 cents prior to the complaint over some of their lines.

Jap Rented Rig—Officers are now on the lookout south for a little brown Jap with a horse and buggy he "rented" from the Fashion Stables last Tuesday, and has forgotten to return the rig. The Jap was last seen crossing Hall's ferry, five miles south of here on the river road, but no further trace can be found of him. SALEM FACTIONS FIGHT OVER P. O.

A quiet but determined political fight is going on over the appointment of a postmaster at Salem to succeed Squire Farrar, the present incumbent. Congressman Hawley and his closest advisers, like Dr. Richardson and others, are all lined up for John W. Roland, while the opposition are solidly arrayed for Hal D. Patton. Patton is the well known leader of the young Republicans, who made the big fight for a statement No. 1 delegation from Marion county, and was elected without opposition to the legislature. He will not circulate any petitions at present but it is claimed by his friends that he can get any number of endorsements whenever he wants them. Roland is equally popular in other circles, having held several positions of trust and as the saying is, made good in all of them. Squire Farrar is understood to have a strong pull with the department and it might be that he would hang onto the job.

Spaulding Mill Busy—The sale of lumber is evidently going on at a steady pace this season from the amount sawed by the Spaulding Logging Company here and the even hours being put in. For the past four months the mills have been operating 10 hours a day and sawing out 65,000 feet a day. All of this lumber is being used principally by Salem builders. The railroad companies are also making preparations for their yearly improvements on the tracks and hundreds of ties are being cut out.

Boyle Found Guilty—Mercer, Pa., May 6.—James H. Boyle was convicted today of kidnapping Billy Whitla.

The trial occupied three and one-half hours actual work and the jury was out only 45 minutes before returning its verdict. The penalty for kidnapping is from one year to life imprisonment.

Before the jury reported and while the prisoner was still in the court room, Mrs. Boyle was arraigned and the work of selecting a jury to hear her case began.
