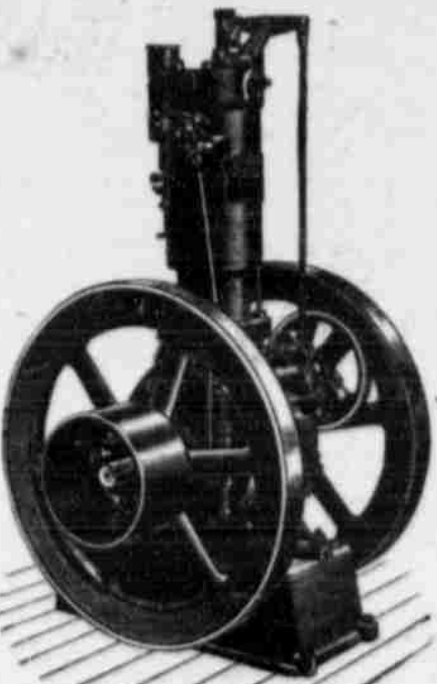

SECRETARY SALEM BOARD OF TRADE TELLS OF PUBLICITY WORK AT EUGENE BOOSTERS CONVENTION

Secretary Hofer said that their first promotion fund was \$10,000—and they spent it all. As for returns, they kept a record of people coming from the east and buying real estate or businesses. These people spent a million dollars in Salem and Marion county. Records also show that a million was spent for street and railroad improvements and new buildings.

A committee by hard work secured promises from capitalists to build 100 houses last year, but finally 325 were built, and still, the city needed homes.

"We have a checkerboard factory in Salem. Our boards are a mile square and as there are 64 squares on a checkerboard we are making 10-acre squares, and settlers are buying them. We want to make all of Marion county a great checkerboard. I do not believe we can do much trying for factories just yet; factories follow population, not precede it.

"Gentlemen, the local papers are the best things to send to prospective settlers. If they are full of live advertisements, the reader will be impressed with the idea that there is

something moving in that town. He will be interested in what Tom Smith, his old neighbor, is doing out there in the west. What he wants to read is the hard facts about the west—information boiled down.

"One of the best adjuncts of a commercial club is an organized body of real estate men, who will do business right, not knock each other or their town."

"Mr. Hofer was asked by Tom Richardson to tell of his German correspondence. He is a German himself and has numbers of Germans in the east who are interested in Oregon and are writing concerning it. These are substantial citizens, and he told of one family in particular who arrived the day before the big snow. The newcomer went to his newly purchased farm, and moved into the small cabin with snow on the floor. Just the other day this man came to Secretary Hofer's office and told him to write to a dozen of his old acquaintances in the east, telling them this country is all right. In this way the names of many prospective settlers are secured. The results take care of themselves."

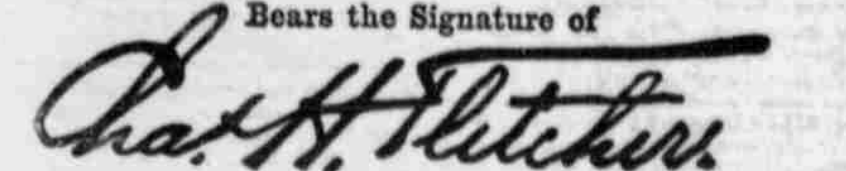
