A FATAL AFFRAY AT GATES

SULLIVAN DEAD AND HERVE IS DYING

One man is dead and the other is in a precarious condition today, as the result of a pistol duel over a woman, who had captured the affections of both, the men being William Herve more commonly called "Smoke House Bill," an engineer for the Curtis Logging Company, and Henry Sullivan, president of the Golden Arch Mining Company, and a much-liked citizen of Gates.

The unfortunate tragedy occurred shortly after 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon, when Sullivan arrived in Gates from a trip to the mines on the Little North Fork of the Santiam. Herve was standing on the veranda of the Koonz hotel when the stage arrived, and, as Sullivan got out, Herve pointed his revolver at him, and Sullivan dodged behind other passengers, who had just got out of the stage, while he reached after his own gun. As soon as he got it, he stepped out from behind the others, and the duel began. Herve, on the porch, was a few feet above Sullivan, but as they began shooting each advanced. Herve fired five shots and Sullivan three, and each found the mark but once. Sullivan was shot in the neck, the ball ranging downward, while Herve was shot in the abdomen. After Sullivan fell, Herve, who had emptied his pistol, walked to him, and, with considerable profanity, stooped over and struck Sullivan on the head with his pistol. Then he picked up Sullivan's pistol and handed it, along with his own, to bystanders and remarked, "My God, I've done it," and fell.

According to the story told by people of Gates to T. M. Humphrey, mail clerk on the Corvallis & Eastern railroad, who reached Albany last night, Herve sent for a girl from Aumsville, Marion county, to come to Gates and meet him.

The girl came, but through some misunderstanding Herve failed to meet the train. Sullivan met the girl in Gates, according to the story received here, formed an acquaintance with her and took her into the Gold Creek mining district. This occurred about a week ago, and Herve, learning of the girl's whereabouts, swore vengeance on Sullivan. He heard that Sullivan would come out of the mines today, and prepared to receive him, and threatened to shoot him on sight. A friend met the stage and told Sullivan this, but it did not prevent the meeting.

Herve is an Italian, and has been in the employ of the Curtis Logging Company but a short time. Sullivan has resided in Gates a long time, and was liked by all who knew him. He was once in the employ of James M. Sears, a Gates business man, who spoke highly of him yesterday, when talking about the shooting.

Sullivan died early this morning, and there seems to be but little chance, if any, for Herve.

A wire from Gates this afternoon says the woman's name is L. B. Reynolds, and that she has two children, the elder four years, the younger about two years. Herve was reported alive at 2 o'clock this afternoon, but with small chance of remaining so.

MAY ERECT A CREMATORY HERE

Frank B. Gibson, superintendent of the Portland Crematory Company, has been in the city a few days looking over the grounds and possibilities for an up-to-date crematory, and although there is no definite plans made for the erection of the building Mr. Gibson is of the opinion Salem people would sanction such a move and that this mode of handling the dead will be a great benefit to the public in general.

Mr. Gibson and Undertaker W. T. Rigdon are looking over the situation and when Mr. Gibson returns there will probably be some move made toward putting up an establishment here on the same plans the crematory in Portland is built on. It has been suggested that a five or ten thousand dollar stone building be erected in which to install the furnaces and other devices and to build it near the east gate of the Odd Fellows' cemetery.
