LAYS BLAME ON SOME WOMAN OF COURSE

Portland, May 10.—In fear of being arrested at each stop of the train Mrs. Hazel Moore, for love of whom former Adjutant General Orin Hamilton of the Washington state nation-

approximately \$33,000 of military funds, is today riding southward to Oakland, Cal.

Accompanied by her beautiful eight-year-old daughter she occupies a private drawing room on the Southern Pacific train which left Portland at 7:45 o'clock last night. In a brief interview granted while she was aboard the train Mrs. Moore em-

phatically denied she was responsible for Hamilton's downfall. She attributed all his trouble to a woman she called Nora Hamilton. During the conversation she frequently used slang, and threatened to slap the face of the reporter with whom she was talking if he dared to print anything that was not to her liking. "The story that Mr. Hamilton provided me with funds is absurd," she declared.

"Nora Hamilton is the woman in the case. Take my word for it. She carried a deposit in a Portland bank. That money was given to her by Mr. Hamilton."

Occasionally she would end a sentence abruptly to inquire if a certain man on the train was a detective. She expressed the fear that she would be arrested before she reached Oakland.

"The stories that I take a drink now and then," she resumed, "are true. But it is not true that I ever took a drink while I was in Mr. Hamilton's presence. It is also true that he took me to dinner at times, as any man might do, but he never squandered any money on me. Really, I never did see him take a drink of intoxicants."

Mrs. Moore says she may go to New York and thence to London, the home of her late husband, a wealthy mining man. She says she was born in Louisville, Ky., and that she was married when she was 14 years old.

JAPS IN HONOLULU GO ON A STRIKE

Honolulu, May 10.—Every Japanese laborer on the Honolulu plantations walked out on strike today, demanding higher wages. A quiet attempt is being made by the leaders of the Japanese to enlist the plantation employees of other nationalities, and the situation is extremely serious.

The Japanese consul is on the scene, and has promised that there shall be no violence. The strikers are well organized, and it is feared cannot be held in check if agitators succeed in inciting them to riot.

There is some dissatisfaction among the strikers because they are being assessed for maintenance of the strikers. This is looked on as a favorable indication by the planters, who hope that by disrupting the organization they will be able to break the strike.

LOST BABY FOUND IN BALE OF COTTON

Galveston, Tex., May 10.—Dispatches received here today from Liverpool, England, cleared up the mystery that has surrounded the disappearance five months ago of 2-year-old Alfred Hartman, son of George Hartman, a cotton grower of Gillespie county.

In December Hartman hauled a load of cotton to be ginned at Fredericksburg, near his home. His little son accompanied him. When he started the return trip the lad was

missing, and it was thought he had fallen into a creek.

The message from Liverpool told of the finding of the body of the boy in the center of a bale of cotton when it was opened in a wharf warehouse. It is thought that the baby crept in to the open press at the gin in Fredericksburg, and was bound up with the product. The cotton was kept in a local warehouse for several months before its shipment to Liverpool.

WHO BLOWS BELLOWS, JOHNSON OR JEFFRIES?

Chicago, May 10.—Jim Jeffries arrived here today and stated that on July 26, when his theatrical engagements come to an end, he would probably announce the date on which he would be willing to meet Jack Johnson in a battle for the world's heavyweight championship.

Jeffries was accompanied to Chicago by his wife and a number of sporting writers. He will begin his theatrical engagement here tonight. The white champion was frank in expressing his opinion of Johnson and declared that he did not care to have anything to do with the negro except in a business way.

"Johnson had better not come around me with his 'demands and thousand dollar bills,'" declared the Los Angeles boiler-maker. "It might not be healthy for him."

Jeffries was met at the station by a delegation of friends and escorted to a hotel, where a reception was tendered him.
