Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve and propose to improve at the expense of abutting and adjacent property Winter street in the city of Salem, Oregon, from the north curb line of Mill street to the north line of Oak street, the roadway of said portion of said street shall be improved full width from curb to curb by grading the same and placing thereon a crushed rock improvement, provided intersections shall be improved for a width of 29½ feet on both sides of the center line of said Winter street, excepting herefrom, however, a strip 7 feet in width extending full length of the proposed improvement to be occupied by the street railway track of the Portland Railway Light & Power Co., and improved by said company. Curb lines shall be established and said street shall be improved in every respect in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted therefor by the common council on file in the office of the city recorder, and which also show an estimate of the cost. Demonstrations may be filed against said improvement in the manner and within the time provided by law.

DR. JOHN E. PEYTON DEAD; WILL BE BURIED HERE

A news item in the Oregonian Monday says:

"News of the death of Dr. John Eberly Peyton at Redlands, Cal., was received yesterday by Mrs. Josephine E. Walker of San Francisco, his sister-in-law, who is visiting in Portland. Dr. Peyton was a son of the late Dr. Daniel Peyton, dean of the Willamette medical college at Salem. His son was born in Missouri 52 years ago and came to Oregon with his parents at an early age, and settled at Salem, where he resided for many years. After graduating from the Willamette medical college he removed to Drain, Or., where he practiced for 12 years.

"Fourteen years ago he went to Redlands, Cal., where he has since made his home. He was married to Miss Eliza Kinney of Salem, daughter of the late R. C. Kinney of that city, and pioneer of 1847. He is survived by his wife, a daughter, Miss Grace Peyton, and a sister, Mrs. Edgar Farrington of Eugene. Mrs. Peyton is a sister of Mrs. Josephine E. Walker of San Francisco and Dr. Alfred Kinney of Astoria.

"The funeral arrangements have

not been completed, although the interment will be at Salem."

Dr. Peyton was well known by all old-time Salem residents, for here he grew to manhood and here he married the wife who survives him, Miss Eliza Kinney, whose father was not only a pioneer resident but also a pioneer in other ways. He was generally known as "Uncle Bob," and at one time owned the Salem flouring mill. The first cargo of flour exported from Oregon came from these mills, largely, and was sent by "Uncle Bob" to Liverpool. The death of the family have all been brought here for burial, and the body of Dr. Peyton will be brought to Salem as soon as arrangements are completed. Dr. Peyton was a member of the Masonic fraternity and it is probable the funeral services will be under the direction of the local lodge of the order.
