

ROBBERS HOLD UP
SEATTLE SALOON

Seattle, Wash., May 12.—Armed with big revolvers and wearing handkerchiefs to hide their features, two well dressed men held up the Australian bar on Fifth avenue South about midnight last night.

Twenty men, who were in the place at the time, raised their hands at the command of the holdup men, and stood motionless with their backs to the bar and waited breathlessly until the robbers had completed their task.

From the cash register of the saloon \$70 was taken, while from the patrons of the place \$75 more was secured.

In the safe behind the bar there was about \$1000. The safe was locked and Arthur King, the bartender, told the robbers he did not know the combination.

Four minutes after the robbers had quietly slipped out of a side door, the patrolman on the beat walked in saloon. When informed of the hold-up he telephoned to the police station and detectives hurried to the scene, but there was no clue to the thugs.

Tomorrow night the king of wrestlers, Frank Gotch, will be seen at the Grand opera house, pitting his enormous strength and agility against little Eddie O'Connell, the young man who showed such excellent work on the mat in this city recently by throwing Joe La Salle two straight falls out of three. Last night, in Portland, Gotch gave a demonstration of his phenomenal strength and wrestling ability, by picking up Eddie O'Connell, holding him in the air and laying him down on the mat with apparently no more effort than had Eddie been a lead pencil. This is a feat that no man in the country would care to do, owing to O'Connell's lightning actions and his wiry muscles. O'Connell squirmed and struggled every minute while the big man was playing with him, but of no avail, Gotch having absolute control of the match throughout.

The above is an exact likeness of the wrestler, showing his ponderous breast, and long, sinewy arms; his powerful waist and legs, and one night judge from his appearance that no limit could be placed on the wonderful man's manner of dealing with an opponent on the carpet. Dr. Roller, the former champion was said to be a perfectly built man, but Gotch is built much more powerful and perfect than Roller, and it is said he is considerably quicker on his feet.

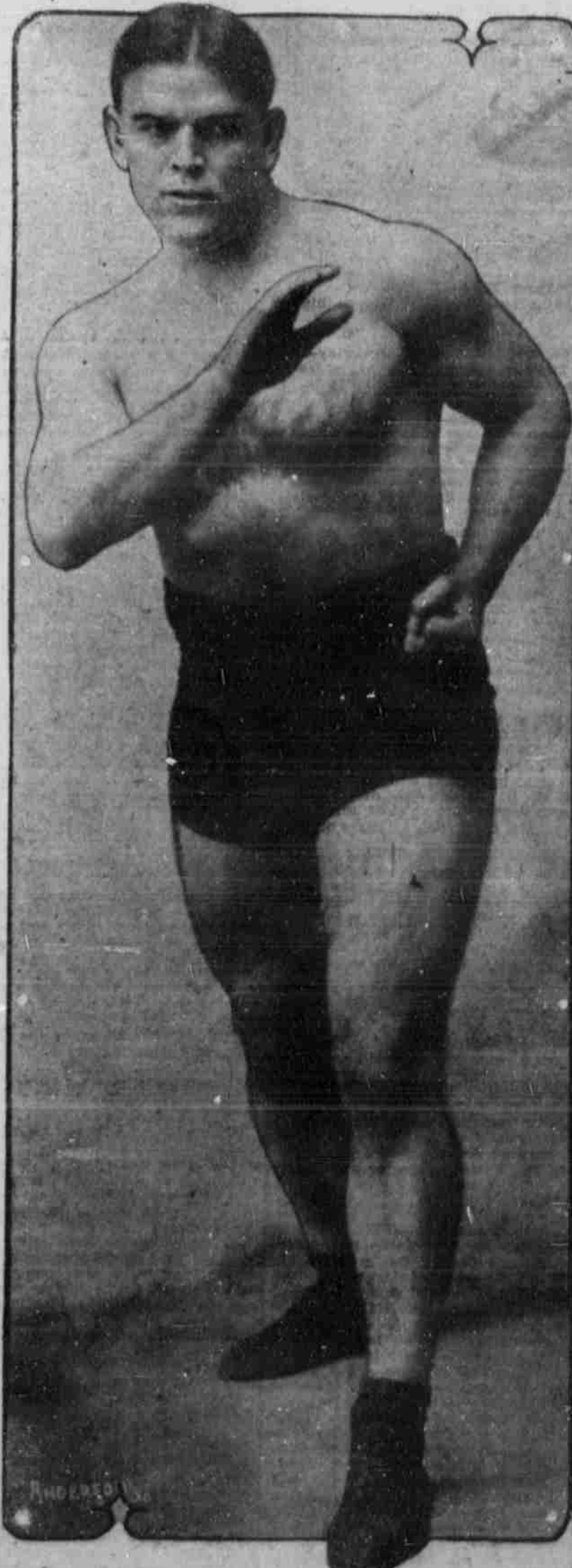

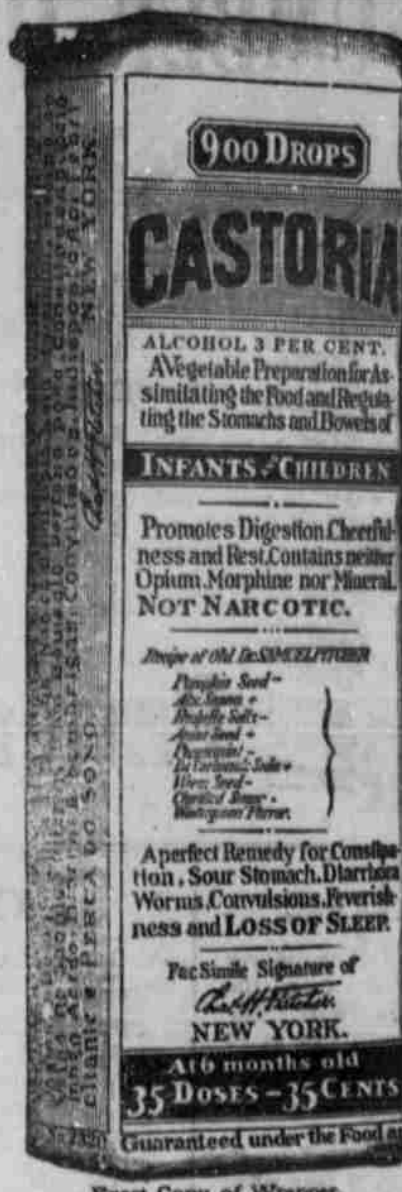
