CALHOUN TRIAL STILL DRAGS ALONG ITS WEARY WAY

[United Press Leased Wire.] San Francisco, May 13.—John H. Meyer, of San Mateo, director of the United Railroads, testified today in the Calhoun trial, that he had no knowledge of the \$600,000 in currency alleged to have been drawn from the United States mint upon Calhoun's order.

It is expected that the prosecution will seize upon this testimony to attempt to show that knowledge of the money said to have been drawn was confined to the defendant and others closely associated with him.

Under the guidance of counsel for the defense, Meyer averred that he had never heard of any connection between Abe Ruef and the United Railroads Company, and that Ruef had never been in the employ of the company.

Calhoun's right hand man in the executive offices of the United Railroads, Thornwall Mallally, today took the stand for the first time since the proceedings commenced, and denied any knowledge of the alleged bribe sum of \$200,000, denying emphatically that he ever was present at the mint when Thery L. Ford presented a currency order signed by the defendant.

Mullally was loth to leave the stand when his examination was over. Only the advice of the court to confine his answers to the questions asked by the attorneys served to stop repeated declarations of the yeoman service done by the United Railroads and its officers during the period after the fire and earthquake of April 18, 1906.

RIOTING CONTINUES IN PARIS OVER THE POSTAL STRIKE

[United Press Leased Wire.] Paris, May 13.—A serious outbreak was prevented by the troops this afternoon when there was a clash between the Socialists and the Radicals and Nationalists in the chamber of deputies. Morrel, a Socialist, was hooted down by the Radicals and Nationalists, when he tried to address the chamber.

Two hundred postmen were forced to join the strikers this afternoon. Delegations representing the strikers threatened the postmen with violence if they did not walk out.

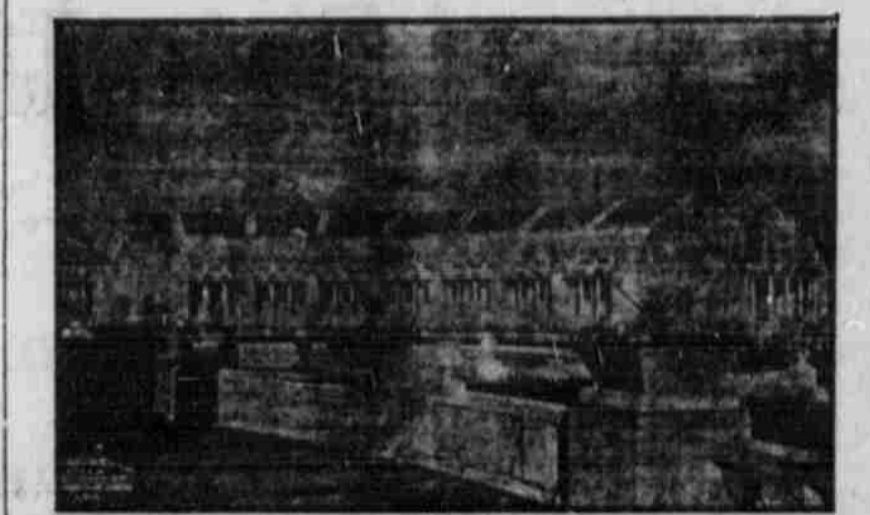
