WORKING THE ANTS AGAINST THE SCALE

[United Press Leased Wire.] Ukiah, Cal., May 14.—Ranchers of this section are enthusiastic over a novel plan for combatting the destructive fruit tree scale that has been discovered by Professor Harlan.

Harlan learned that the ordinary black ant is a deadly foe to the scale and the experiments tried by the Ukiah ranchers prove that a colony of the ants will rid a tree of its scale in surprisingly short time.

According to the method most popular among the experimenters, a plate of sugar is placed near an ant hill, and when it becomes covered with the little insects it is removed to a fork of the tree to be treated. The ants at once leave the sugar and attack the scale vigorously. When they have cleaned the tree of the pest they again congregate on the sugar and are moved to another tree. It is thought that the discovery will be worth thousands of dollars to the fruit growers.

SAN FRANCISCO MAIL CLERKS GO AFTER CASH

San Francisco, May 14.—Chester P. Rowley, the second clerk caught stealing mail in the main postoffice here within a week, is in jail today in default of \$1000 bail.

Rowley came under suspicion of the inspectors while they were shadowing Clark Dunham, who was arrested a few days ago. Later on one of the inspectors saw Rowley take a letter and conceal it in his sock. He was arrested before he had time to get rid of the incriminating envelope.

FRENCH STRIKE ON MAILS IS BROKEN

Paris, May 14.—Movement of the mails today, with the exception of printed matter, is almost normal, and it is believed that the strike is nearly broken.

Government officials are authority for the statement today that many of the strikers are returning to work.
