Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of Winter Street.

Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve and propose to improve at the expense of abutting and adjacent property Winter street in the city of Salem, Oregon, from the north curb line of Mill street to the north line of Oak street, the roadway of said portion of said street shall be improved full width from curb to curb by grading the same and placing thereon a crushed rock improvement, provided intersections shall be improved for a width of 29 1/2 feet on both sides of the center line of said Winter street, excepting herefrom, however, a strip 7 feet in width extending full length of the proposed improvement to be occupied by the street railway track of the Portland Railway Light & Power Co., and improved by said company. Curb lines shall be established and said street shall be improved in every respect in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted therefor by the common council on file in the office of the city recorder, and which also show an estimate of the cost.

Remonstrances may be filed against said improvement in the manner and within the time provided by law.

Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of Winter Street.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve and propose to improve at the expense of abutting and adjacent property Winter street, in the City of Salem, Oregon, from the south line of State street to a point within 1 1/2 feet of the north rail of the railroad track of the Southern Pacific Co., where it crosses said Winter street at the intersection of Winter and Trade streets. The roadway of said portion of said street shall be improved full width from curb to curb by grading the same and placing thereon a crushed rock improvement the full width from curb to curb, including the full intersection of Ferry street where it intersects Winter street on the west side of said Winter street. The intersection of Winter and Trade streets from the north line of Trade street to a point 1 1/2 feet of the north rail of the railroad track of the Southern Pacific Co., shall be improved for a width of 29 1/2 feet on both sides of the center line of said Winter street excepting herefrom, however, a strip 7 feet in width extending full length of the proposed improvement to be occupied by the street railway track of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co., and improved by said company. Curb lines shall be established and said street shall be improved in every respect in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted therefor by the common council and on file in the office of the city recorder.

Remonstrances may be filed against said improvement in the manner and within the time provided in the charter of said city.
