SPORTING NEWS OF IMPORTANCE FROM BAY CITY

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, May 18.—It was learned today that Eddie Graney, famous referee and fight promoter, was married May 5, to Miss Agnes Milhoan, 25 years of age, former stenographer in the office of Abe Ruef. The young lady also was known here as Agnes Hamilton, having adopted the name of her stepfather. Graney's first wife died about a year ago.

Failing to match Billy Papke with Sam Langford, Promoter Jim Coffroth is conducting negotiations today with Willie Britt for another Papke-Ketchel match.

Coffroth tried to make arrangements last night for the fight, but could not get the fighters to agree upon weight terms. Papke asserted that they should weigh in at noon, while Britt maintained 10:30 a. m. would be the proper time. Finally the promoter lost patience and declared all negotiations off for the night. Early today, however, he was on the job again, and hopes that before night his wire conversation with Britt will have terminated satisfactorily.

Papke was positive in his refusal to meet Langford when Coffroth tried to hypnotize him into signing a contract with the negro. He said that he might take Sam on later, but that his next match, if he had his way, would be with Ketchel.

Boasting \$1000 to assure good faith Billy Papke today offered to bet \$2500 that Chick Hudson, the Seattle lightweight, could beat Battling Nelson in a fight for the world's championship.

"I've seen Nelson fight, and I believe Hudson has it on him," said Papke today. "When Nelson met Joe Gans last Fourth of July he made a bungling fight against a man who was evidently all in, and was as stiff as a slab."

"I will leave this money up for ten days, so that Nelson may have ample time to cover it. Ten minutes' notice is all I need in which to furnish the balance of the wager, if Nelson accepts the proposition."

"The fight can be pulled off at as short notice and over any distance Nelson desires to. This is a case where money talks."

Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of Ferry Street.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve, and proposes to improve, at the expense of abutting and adjacent property, Ferry street in said city, full width from curb to curb, with Warren Brothers' Bitulite Waterproof Pavement, from the east line of Front street to the west curb line of Liberty street, excepting that portion of said Ferry street which is intersected by Commercial street and excepting a strip eight feet in width extending along the center of the proposed improvement which is to receive the street railway track of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway Company, and excepting a strip seven feet in width which is to receive a switch track of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, and which shall extend from the alley running through block 35 in the City of Salem, Oregon, to connect with the said street railway track of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway Company, as shown in the plan.

A. M. ASS'N FIGHTING ORGANIZED LABOR

(United Press Leased Wire.)
New York, May 18.—In a strenuous attack upon union labor and labor organizations, James W. Van Cleave opened the convention of the National Association of Manufacturers here today. As president of the organization, he made a report in which he defended the aggressive policy pursued by the officers in the contests with labor leaders, and indicated that more hard fighting must be expected.

He reviewed the events of the year, as he said, "in order to reveal the adroitness, persistency and unscrupulousness of the enemies with whom every employer in the United States will have to deal, and thus give an indication of the manner in which we will have to proceed in the future to make our labor count."

Van Cleave referred to the fact that certain members had expressed the opinion that the measures taken had been too aggressive, and had suggested that more could have been accomplished by conciliation. In this connection, he declared that the association had set the program for the officers. He said that they had met the alternative of fighting or surrendering, and that he had always fought. In part he said:

"We defeated them at Washington, and then the conspirators massed their forces at Chicago and attempted to frighten the National Republican convention into sanctioning an anti-Democratic, anti-Republican and anti-American propaganda. We defeated them there also."

"With the cunning engendered by a quarter century of duplicity, the labor leaders then transferred their field to the state legislatures."

"Let me warn this association that under the cloak of legislation for the defense or pretended defense of working women and children, insidious attempts undoubtedly will be made by the politicians of the trades unions to get special favors for their organizations."

Van Cleave went on record as favoring an amendment providing for a tariff bill as suggested by the finance committee of the senate.

He referred to the "menace of permitting immigrants to become influenced by the federation, which has grown up amongst us, and which sets and decrees its leaders to be above the laws of the land."

In predicting that more serious trouble is yet in store, Van Cleave said:

"As I have just pointed out, the United States in 1896 abolished the Indian tribal governments, France in 1909 has subverted the insurgent civil servants. Now I ask you what sort of treatment the American people in 1910, 1912 and 1915 will be forced to deal out to the rebellious American Federation of Labor."

The report of the committee of interstate commerce was presented and contained a denunciation of legislative regulation of common carriers. It referred to the \$29,000,000 fine which Judge Landis assessed against the Standard Oil Company as a "mere outburst of judicial frenzy."

A protest against ships and shipper's being taxed in operation was contained in the report.

The report deplored the destruction of the natural forests of the nation and contained an estimate that at the present rate of lumbering the lumbermen will deplete the forests directly and indirectly will destroy many of the waterways of the country within eight years.
