A VIEW OF THE COURT OF HONOR, A.-Y.-P. EXPOSITION, SEATTLE.

All of the principal buildings of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition are grouped in close compass around the Cascades and Geysir Basin and the flower beds which line each.

The picture shows a view from the lower side of Geysir Basin, directly up the Court of Honor. On the right are seen the Palace of Manufactures, the Oriental and Hawaiian Buildings. On the left are the European Exhibits and Alaskan Buildings. In the far center is the Central Government, which shows its incomplete front as it looked on April 15. On that date this was the heaviest piece of construction to be finished before the opening day of the Exposition and the contractors estimated that it would take them ten days to do the work.

Geysir Basin is in the foreground, and just beyond it show the steps in the Cascades.

Inspected Salem's Fleet--
Inspector McGrath of the United States ship inspection office made a trip to Independence yesterday and measured the new stern wheeler which is to be put on the Willamette to ply from this city to Independence. He stopped over in this city on his return trip to Portland and staid up several small river craft near the O. C. T. Company's dock here. He passed on everything he went over, however, including the Skinner boat "Louise." Mr. Skinner has had the launch which was formerly built for carrying passengers between Independence and Salem remodeled, and Percy Larsen, Salem's young ship doctor, now has the old boat spinning about the river in fine style.

The hearing on grain rates charged over the O. R. & N. main lines and branches is being held today. Several attorneys for the railroad company are on hand, and several shippers who transact business over the road.

To Condemn Land--
An order has been received by Attorney-General Crawford from the board of regents to take action in condemning certain land near the Corvallis college, which has been negotiated for by the board for some time, but which the owners refuse to sell with.

Referendum Petition--
A referendum petition has been filed with the Attorney-General by the citizens of Baker county remonstrating on the salary raise of the circuit judge of Baker county by the last legislature from \$3000 to \$4000 a year.

Seven Young Graduates--
County School Superintendent Smith attended the Riekey school graduating exercises last night, and presented seven diplomas to students graduating from the eighth grade. Superintendent Smith praised the Riekey school highly on the excellent exercises, and said he never had the pleasure of seeing a better arranged program than that made by the teacher of the Riekey school, Miss Carrie Belknap.
