OLD MILL OFFICE BURNED

The fire department was called this morning about 9 o'clock to the home of Adam Frohmader on North Front street and when the fire fighters arrived they found the roof of the building in a mass of flames. The chemical engine was the first on the grounds and held the flames in check for a time until the engine arrived and two streams of water were played on the conflagration. Many willing hands were the means of saving most of the furniture and other contents of the building, the men and boys stripping the place of furnishings in a very short time. The fire engine did effective work on the blazing structure, but before the flames could be got under control the entire roof was burned nearly off, and the upper portion of the building was ruined. The fire caught from a defective flue it is supposed, and the shingles on the roof being perfectly dry, the flames soon spread over the building, and had it not been for quick action by the fire department the place would have been laid in ashes.

The house stood on the property of the Salem Flouring Mills near Mill creek on North Front street and had at one time been the office of the big brick mills which are now in ruins a short distance from the house burned this morning. The mill property is evidently doomed to complete destruction. Not long ago the large wooden division of the mills was burned to the ground with many pounds of flax in it, and shortly afterward the lower building containing the water wheel and power for the mills was burned, and then the last section of the one-time largest mill in the state was swept to the ground by fire. This last structure was made of brick and was a valuable piece of property. The lower floor of the old brick mills was covered with dry flax belonging to Mr. Bosse, the flax mill man, at the time it caught fire.

MIKE MCCARTHY HURT BY RUNAWAY TEAM

A bad runaway occurred between the asylum and penitentiary this morning, when a large team belonging to Chesley Ralph, a teamster working on the railroad spur which is being laid between the two institutions, suddenly became frightened, and ran away, with Mike McCarthy, foreman of the gang working on the road, hanging to the two frightened animals' bridles. McCarthy was standing in front of the horses when they started to run, and he caught them by the heads with the intention of stopping them, but was dragged along for nearly three blocks before he let go, sustaining a fractured shoulder blade and a broken arm in the mixup.

The ambulance was called as soon as possible, and the injured man taken to the Salem Hospital, where Dr. W. H. Byrd dressed his wounds. The horses that caused the trouble were, of course, not hurt.

GEORGE HOYT OF JEFFERSON DIES AT PORTLAND

Word was received by friends in this city of the death at a Portland hospital of George Hoyt, a prominent citizen and well known resident of Jefferson, which occurred this morning. He has been ill for four or five months and was attended by his wife, who was a daughter of Hon. Chas. Miller. He leaves a son about 17 years old. The funeral will be held from the late home of deceased at Jefferson Sunday at 2 p. m.

Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of Ferry Street.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve, and proposes to improve, at the expense of abutting and adjacent property, Ferry street in said city, full width from curb to curb, with Warren Brothers' Bitulithic Waterproof Pavement, from the east line of Front street to the West curb line of Liberty street, excepting that portion of said Ferry street which is intersected by Commercial street and excepting a strip eight feet in width extending along the center of the proposed improvement which is to receive the street railway track of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway Company, and excepting a strip seven feet in width which is to receive a switch track of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, and which shall extend from the alley running through block 35 in the City of Salem, Oregon, to connect with the said street railway track of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway Company, as shown in the plan.

Said improvement shall be made

in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted by the Common Council of said city on the 17th day of May, 1909, and which are hereby referred to and made a part of this notice.

Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of Winter Street.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve, and proposes to improve, at the expense of abutting and adjacent property, Winter street, in the City of Salem, Oregon, from the south line of State street to a point within 1 1/2 feet of the north rail of the railroad track of the Southern Pacific Co., where it crosses said Winter street at the intersection of Winter and Trade streets. The roadway of said portion of said street shall be improved the full width from curb to curb by grading the same and placing thereon a crushed rock improvement the full width from curb to

curb, including the full intersection of Ferry street where it intersects Winter street on the west side of said Winter street. The intersection of Winter and Trade streets from the north line of Trade street to a point 1 1/2 feet of the north rail of the railroad track of the Southern Pacific Co., shall be improved for a width of 29 1/2 feet on both sides of the center line of said Winter street excepting herefrom, however, a strip 7 feet in width extending full length of the proposed improvement to be occupied by the street railway track of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co., and improved by said company. Curb lines shall be established and said street shall be improved in every respect in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted therefor by the common council and on file in the office of the city recorder.

Remonstrances may be filed against said improvement in the manner and within the time provided in the charter of said city.
