DEMANDS TO KNOW WHERE WE STAND ON MOMENTOUS ISSUE

Commissioner Evans has sounded the alarm, and not any too soon, that death lurks on the feet and wings of the ubiquitous fly, and he calls upon the citizens to declare an unrelenting war against this insidious enemy of mankind. It is singular that our medical and scientific men are the last to discover what many laymen like myself have known for a long time. And it has always been so. It is not so very long since the practice of bleeding has been discontinued and this reform was brought about by the protests of the common people. You and I can recollect when we were forbidden to give a drink of cold water to a poor fellow burning with fever. But one night a patient crazy with a fever jumped out of bed and drank a pitcher-full, and the next day he was well! And now we are allowed to drink all the cold water we want, no matter what ails us. The same is true of appendicitis. This disease used to go by the name of inflammation and thousands died from it never suspecting that they owned an appendix. But when the little thing was no use for anything and now consultation and concluded that it was a man feels a pain in the bowels the doctor whips out a knife, cuts it out and throw it to the dogs, and the sufferer feels better than he ever did in his life.

Well, now, Colonel, you know that I have been fighting the fly nuisance for the last 12 years, and am still at it. I didn't make much headway, as I had too much territory to cover. In other words, there was too many of them and not enough of me. Had I been assisted by a great man like you, with a paper at his back, I might have succeeded. But there you stood, poking fun at my efforts and employed your talents raising cats and strawberries while I set traps, sprinkled powders and put out flypaper in my office and home. It is true that I caught and slew thousands of flies, several cats and one or two loafers, besides putting up an unequal contest against one of the most persistent and insidious enemies that ever sought the destruction of the human family. But there is much work still to be done.

One day I spread a sheet of flypaper on a chair and Mr. Smith came round as usual and sat down upon it. I kept very quiet lest he might charge my being the perpetrator of the trick. As he walked down the street to the wharf I noticed that every pedestrian on the street turned around and looked after him, wondering, I suppose, where he captured the badge. It was several days before he came around again. I still looked as innocent as I could; but I noticed that he must have spent a lot of time and energy making the old pair of pants presentable again.

Now, Colonel, let me urge upon you to take a firm stand on this burning question. Get the Weekly Bulletin issued by Health Commissioner Evans of Chicago and notice the many suggestions he offers for fighting the enemy. We must redouble our efforts until there is not a fly left to tell the tale. Put out liquid poison and sticky flypaper. Pour kerosene into the drains and keep your sewerage system in good order. Sprinkle chloride of lime over the contents of garbage boxes and other refuse. Never go unarmed and allow nothing with wings escape. I am glad the last legislature passed no bill for the protection of the housefly. They devoted their attention to hat pins, bed sheets and sterilization exclusively, so there is no closed season for the fly. Now let war be declared, and the day will not be far off when you and I can sit down and discuss politics without being annoyed by either mosquitoes flies or other "annoyers." PICTURES OF SALEM THAT TELL HER HISTORY

There are two pictures in the west window of the Meyers store that are attracting and deserve to attract much attention. One is a bird's-eye view of Salem, "The Cherry City of the World," taken this year, and the other a photograph of the city taken in 1858, 51 years ago. The latter picture was taken from the other side of Mill creek near the Brown residence, and the first building in the foreground is that now occupied by Mr. Walker with his paint store, on the corner of Commercial and Trade streets. In the upper story of this building in those days Joe Wilson, afterwards congressman from Oregon, had his law office. From there there does not seem to be any buildings until about State street, and the part of the city east of High street was about as God

made it. Around the main picture are views of churches, business buildings and residences. But few of the old buildings remain, one of which is the Episcopal church. The old Methodist church still stands, but the cupola is knocked off, and instead of purifying souls and uplifting humanity, it is now used to cleanse soiled clothes, being occupied by the Salem steam laundry. Still as cleanliness is next to godliness the old building is still working in a good cause.

Where the Portland electric offices are, corner of State and Commercial, was a rather pretentious building for those days, and occupied by the W. C. Griswold Co. Space forbids a detailed description of the old buildings still left, but the pictures placed one above the other are a great object lesson and tell the history of 50 years of Salem's growth better than mere words can do.

THIS OLD DUMP WILL SURPRISE SOME SAVANT

What do you suppose the learned savants of those future days would think when they dug into that mass. A reporter made a casual examination of the old dump pile during the week and among other things found iron hoops, wooden hoops, broken pieces of cement, bottles, rags, old sacks, discarded clothing, buttons, all kinds of wire, corks, an old corkscrew, an old tarpaulin, writing paper, newspapers, wall paper, barrel staves, broken demijohns, old chairs, mattresses, wire bed springs, broken crockery, brick-bats, bones, buckets, pots, a skillet, old boots and shoes, hats, rag carpet, dishpan, boxes, nails, paint kegs, brooms, blacking brush, a doll's head, two old lounges, in fact everything imaginable, even to the bung-hole in a barrel.

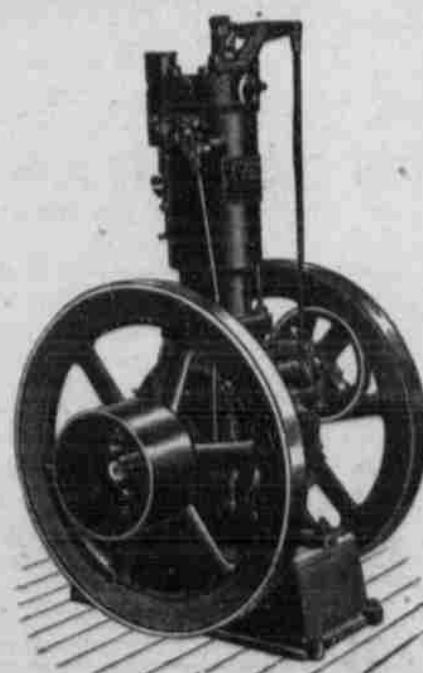
