BOARS' NEST CLUB
LOSES HAPPY HOME

"There is no rose without its thorn," and there are no birds in last year's nests." These trite sayings are recalled because they are peculiarly appropriate to the occasion. As a Journal reporter stood on the corner in front of Bush's bank Saturday and watched the men tearing the roof off the old Red Cross building, he heard behind him a sob, and looking around to discover the source of this evidence of woe he was astonished to find a rather portly, slightly gray-haired gentleman, who resembled Ed Hirsch, but whose face was partly concealed by a very moist handkerchief. Moved by pity the Journal man asked the stranger his trouble and offered to do anything for him he could to assuage his woe; even offered to buy him a drink and as every knows, that is going some—for a reporter.

"I'll tell you," said the aged one. "That old building, for me, is full of tender memories. Many years ago a millionaire's club was started in the upper story of that building, and there some of my happiest hours were spent. In fact, most of my time was spent there, but like a lost umbrella, they are gone forever. I remember well when it was started, and how we all contributed, with generous hearts and loving hands to furnish it with all the comforts of a home. All the members had plenty of money and no pains or anything else was spared to make it an ideal club room. John Q. Wilson contributed a table. It wasn't antique oak, as I remember, but anyway it was antique. W. F. Boothby with tears in his voice presented the club two chairs, the bottoms of which were partly laced with rawhide, and also a cane bottom one, sagged clear through in the center. J. H. Elgin also contributed a couple of chairs which he took from the family woodshed, where his wife had placed them in cold storage. Henry Stapleton donated a venerable stand, a little shaky in its legs but still it would 'stand.' Billy Claggett (the spendthrift of the outfit) brought in a soap box filled with sawdust for a spittoon; John Gray supplied a dozen packs of cards, or rather discards, from the saloons, and Ed Hirsch brought a tin cup and a couple of broken glasses that had at one time ornamented the tables in the old Chemeketa hotel. Col. Page came in later, but as he one time offered to pay the rent he was cut off from active membership, but was still allowed the privileges of the club as an honorary member. To show how keenly he felt this honor the Col. donated the club a picture of Lydia E. Pinkham and a somewhat worn motto, done in old gold worsted that read 'God Bless Our Home.' So you see we were just as happy and comfortable as boys in a play house. Dues were 50 cents a month, and due all the time, as the landlord charged us \$3 a month for the use of the rooms. I forgot to mention that Uncle Tom Davidson was also a prominent member, and he donated a speech and a poem on 'brotherly love'; the latter had an honored place on the wall.

"The jealous ones about town used to call our club names. One was the 'Bull Pen,' another the 'Saints' Rest,' and one even more disrespectful than all nicknamed it the 'Boars' Nest.' However, that's a side issue.

"Claggett, who was reckless with his money, subscribed and paid for The Journal for one week, which was the club's library, and he also got a clerk in a store to print some signs with a marking-pot brush such as 'If you can't pay don't pay.' 'If you don't pay dues quit.' 'Pay for your cigars before you smoke,' and several other cheerful little things like that.

"There we all gathered every day, playing cards, smoking our pipes, talking science, literature, art, and taxes, and damping the assessor, only leaving long enough to go to our meals.

"I remember once when John Gray and Billy Claggett nearly got bopped for gambling, for it was against the rules. They played a rubber of pinocle 11 best in 21 for a nickel and Gray won. The only trouble we ever had was about the rent, for everybody objected to paying dues because he had donated furniture, but somehow we managed to keep going. Those were great old times," said the mournful one: "happy times, but the old home is gone and the club will meet no more forever."

Which is why the reporter remarked there is never a rose without a thorn, and "there are no birds in last year's nests." The old birds had to find the coop.

Portion of Winter Street.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, deem it expedient to improve, and proposes to improve, at the expense of abutting and adjacent property, Winter street, in the City of Salem, Oregon, from a point 1½ feet south of the south rail of the railroad track of the Southern Pacific Co., where it crosses said Winter street at the intersection of Winter and Trade streets to the north curb line of Mill street. Said improvements shall be made with crushed rock for a width of 33 feet on both sides of the center line of said street, excepting therefrom a space 7 feet in width extending along the center of said Winter street, which is to receive the street railway track of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co., and to be improved by said Company, and excepting that portion of said Winter street which is intersected by the tributary of South Mill Creek. Curb lines shall be established and said street shall be improved in every respect in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted therefor by the Common Council and on file in the office of the city recorder, and which also show an estimate of the cost.

Remonstrances may be filed against said improvement in the manner and within the time provided by law.
