COUNCIL GETS BUSY--
ORDERS COURT STREET
PAVED TO TWELFTH
CONTRACT FOR BRIDGE ON CHURCH STREET
IS LET-- CHEMEKETA AND OTHER
STREETS ORDERED OPENED

The city council had a very busy session last night, but it was entirely routine business.

The gravel barge was ordered paid for, and the street committee instructed to enter into a contract with the Minto heirs concerning a landing for the barge on the gravel bar, and other matters pertaining thereto.

The city engineer reported showing the property to be condemned in opening Seventeenth street, and the owners thereof; report adopted.

A remonstrance against improving the south end of Twelfth street was filed, and the matter was indefinitely postponed.

Further time was granted the committee in the matter of South Commercial fire matters.

The application of Fred Fish for a liquor license at the Willamette Hotel was granted.

The bills of the Warren Construction Co., for paving Church street, \$4989.63, and for paving Cottage street, \$5050.52, were ordered paid.

An option on two full blocks and two half blocks in Fairmount Park was submitted from J. M. Brown, \$7000, and another from Elworthy and wife for 14 acres, in same place, for \$10,000; options good until 1910. This was re-referred to the park committee.

The park committee reported having entered into a contract with Mr. Chase for improving Wilson Avenue Park.

Bids for the "Bush" bridge on Church street were opened as follows:

Referred to bridge committee, with instructions to enter into contract with Royal & Son for the work.

The committee on sewers was given full power to act in the matter of the Court street sewer.

The bids for supplying harness for fire department horses referred to committee on fire, with power to act. The committee on streets was empowered to purchase a carload of cement.

The vote by which the resignation of Treasurer Frank Meredith was accepted was reconsidered, and will not be acted upon until the next regular meeting, June 7.

Bills assessing damages for opening Chemeketa and other streets were passed, and much routine business done.

The committee on mountain water made no written report, which will be submitted when the engineers get their report and estimates prepared.

The ordinance raising the salary of the city treasurer to \$50 per month, and providing for a city depository, and that when the city funds were deposited therein the liability of the treasurer and his bondsmen shall cease, was referred to the ordinance committee.

The contract for paving Court street from Church to Twelfth was let to the Warren Construction Co.

The improvement of Broadway was referred to the street committee, it appearing from statement of Councilman Stoliz that a portion of the street was a county road.

The next regular meeting night coming on a holiday, the council adjourned to June 7.

MOB HANGED A NEGRO IN ARKANSAS

[United Press Leased Wire.] Pine Bluff, Ark., May 25.—Levite Davis, a negro 25 years old, was lynched today by a mob of 300 white men. The negro confessed to having choked Amy Holmes, a 15-year-old white girl, who discovered him robbing her parents' home last Friday. He said he feared that she would make an outcry and have him arrested.

When news of the negro's confession got abroad today a mob was quickly formed, took the negro from the authorities and quickly lynched him. Sheriff Philpot and his deputies today tried to prevent the mob from harming the negro but their pleading was in vain. The prisoner was taken from the jail and hanged to a telegraph pole in the business section of the town.

There was no shooting and the mob did its work so quietly that the rest of the population knew nothing of the affair until they saw the body hanging from the pole this morning. No arrests have been made.

Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of Winter Street.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve, and proposes to improve, at the expense of abutting and adjacent property, Winter street, from the south line of State street to a point within 1 1/2 feet of the north rail of the railroad track of the Southern Pacific Co., where it crosses said Winter street at the intersection of Winter and Trade streets. The roadway of said portion of said street shall be improved the full width from curb to curb by grading the same and placing thereon a crushed rock improvement the full width from curb to curb, including the full intersection of Perry street where it intersects Winter street on the west side of said Winter street. The intersection of Winter and Trade streets from the north line of Trade street to a point 1 1/2 feet of the north rail of the railroad track of the Southern Pacific Co., shall be improved for a width of 29 1/2 feet on both sides of the center line of said Winter street excepting herefrom, however, a strip 7 feet in width extending full length of the proposed improvement to be occupied by the street railway track of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co., and improved by said company. Curb lines shall be established and said street shall be improved in every respect in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted therefor by the common council and on file in the office of the city recorder.

Remonstrances may be filed against said improvement in the manner and within the time provided in the charter of said city.

MARKS OF TEETH MAY LEAD TO DISCOVERY

Los Angeles, May 25.—What may prove to be the most important means of identification of the murderer of little Annie Poltera was made known today when detectives and surgeons, who made a minute examination of her body, announced that the two mysterious marks on the cheek and body of the victim were made by the teeth of her father. Impressions were taken of these marks and are said to show such individual characteristics that the owner can easily be identified by means of them. Pictures of the cast will be printed on circulars and sent broadcast throughout the country. It is asserted that there is no doubt but that identification can be accomplished from these casts.

DESPONDENT MAN COMMITS SUICIDE

[United Press Leased Wire.] Portland, May 25.—Choosing to die in the presence of crowds of pedestrians rather than take his own life in the seclusion of his room, J. H. Johnston lifted a bottle containing carbolic acid to his lips, drank the contents, staggered a few feet and dropped dead on a stairway late yesterday.

He was out of employment and despondent. After passing through crowds on the busiest thoroughfares for a few minutes he suddenly stopped in front of a group of men standing on the edge of the sidewalk and took the small bottle from his pocket. His strange actions had attracted the attention of those standing near him but it was not until Johnston raised the vial to his lips that anybody realized that the man contemplated suicide. He was dead before an ambulance arrived.

END OF WHEAT EXPORTS FROM U. S. IS IN SIGHT

Chicago, May 25.—The end of Uncle Sam's export trade in grain is in sight because of high prices prevailing in the United States, according to big export houses in Chicago, and government reports show a big slump for 1909 in wheat and barley though a gain in corn exports. Reports (corrected to May 19) put the wheat exported in April, 1908, at \$3,309,154 as compared with \$598,532 in 1909. For the ten months ending May 1 the wheat exports declined from 90,260,361 bushels last year to 63,040,821 bushels this year. Whatever the result may be in this country the North American continent will continue to ship a great portion of the world's exports for the surplus production is growing at astounding rates in the provinces where settlement is so

rapid and where the Grand Trunk Pacific and Canadian Northern are opening virgin territory or competing with the Canadian Pacific. The annual crop of Canada is now above 125,000,000 bushels. Argentine now exports 100,000,000 bushels a year but the acreage increase and the larger yield per acre of the fertile fields of western Canada promises annually for years to increase the crop and exports of wheat from the Dominion faster than they can increase from Argentine. Only three years ago the exports of Canada were only 35,000,000 bushels, as compared with 63,000,000 from the Danube country, 76,000,000 from the United States, \$9,599,397 from Argentine and 30,000,000 from India. Since that time great changes have been made in export conditions, with necessary changes in transportation rates to equalize the disparity in prices on this continent and abroad. Among other readjustments export shipments of Canadian grain have already been made as predicted by President Charles M. Hays of the Grand Trunk Pacific, from Vancouver on the Pacific coast by boat to Liverpool, the great hopper for the breadstuffs of the world.

John Hayes Hammond has declined the position of minister to China. Some years ago he also declined a higher position offered him by Oom Paul. Hammond paid \$300,000 for the privilege of declining that position because it was so high it would not permit his feet to touch the ground. And it was the worst trade old Oom Paul ever made, too.
