PORTLAND MAN IS ACCUSED OF BIGAMY

Redwood City, Cal., May 27.—Alleged to have eloped with Mary Alice White, the attractive daughter of Cyrus White, a Redlands capitalist, while he had a wife and two children in Pasadena, V. A. McCreery, now a resident of Portland, is named in a warrant issued by the county clerk charging bigamy.

McCreery was a drug clerk in Redlands, and is alleged to have posed as a single man, and won the heart of Miss White. An elopement was arranged. They were married April 11 by Justice James Hannon, of this city.

Rumor that McCreery was already married caused Miss White's father to start an investigation, with the alleged result that the real Mrs. McCreery was found alone with her children in Pasadena.

White immediately communicated with his brother, Albert White, of Chehalis, Wash., who found McCreery in Portland, and took charge of Miss White. He arrived in this city yesterday, and, after swearing to the warrant for the arrest of McCreery, filed extradition papers with the county clerk. They were forwarded to the governor today.

FOREST FIRES RAGE IN UPPER MICHIGAN

Negaunee, Mich., May 27.—Forest fires are raging in this section of the upper peninsula and reports from Dalton say that the town has been destroyed.

When the fire threatened Dalton last night, a special train was ordered and the inhabitants, with as much of their possessions as they could carry away, were taken to a place of safety.

Many fishing and camping parties in the woods are in great danger and their fate probably will be unknown for several days. No rain has fallen in this district in several weeks and the timber is very dry.

TO TAKE THE PLACE OF LATE H. H. ROGERS

New York, May 27.—It became known today that James Moffett is scheduled to succeed Henry H. Rogers as vice-president of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey and president of the National Transit Company, which is the pipe line owned by the oil trust. For two years Moffett practically has taken Rogers' place. He has been in the employ of the Standard ever since he was a small boy.

MISSISSIPPI TOWNS ARE UNDER WATER

Jackson, Miss., May 27.—The town of Quitman is submerged today as the result of a flood. All business is suspended, and the residents have been forced into the upper parts of their houses. Some have had to move out entirely.

The loss from high water is heavy throughout the state. Miles of railroad tracks have been destroyed and the loss to the railroad companies is estimated at a million dollars.

Ada May, wife of John F. Steiwer of this city died at her home after a short illness Wednesday afternoon. She was a daughter of Samuel E. May, at one time secretary of state, having been born in this city in 1857. She leaves a husband and the following children: Mrs. Elmer E. Connel of Deer Island; Frederick Steiwer of Pendleton, Lieutenant Karl Steiwer of Manila, Ruby and Lisle Steiwer, who are students at the Salem high school. She also has a brother, George W. May, residing in Wheeler county.

Mrs. Steiwer was a woman of fine Christian character and very devoted to her home and family. She loved the quiet ways of family life and shunned social prominence. The stamp of her fine nature is left on the splendid family she has bequeathed to the state of whose pioneer families she was an honored member.

Funeral services will be held at the family residence on Friday morning and interment will take place at the Looney family cemetery near Jefferson, in the afternoon.

WESTON NORMAL IS TEMPORARILY CLOSED

The graduation exercises of Weston normal school were concluded Tuesday evening and the school property was formally turned over by President French to the state board represented by E. Hofer of the executive committee. The property is worth about \$75,000 and will not be used for school purposes for the next two years. Former Secretary C. L. Starr of the board remained to complete the transfer by taking an inventory, selling off perishable stuff and putting all under lock and key, with a caretaker in charge of the grounds and buildings. The eastern Oregon normal school students will scatter to the normal schools at Bellingham, Cheney and Lewiston. The faculty is all engaged at various places in the United States. President French accepts a fine position as educational director at the big new Y. M. C. A. at Portland, a work for which he is splendidly prepared.
