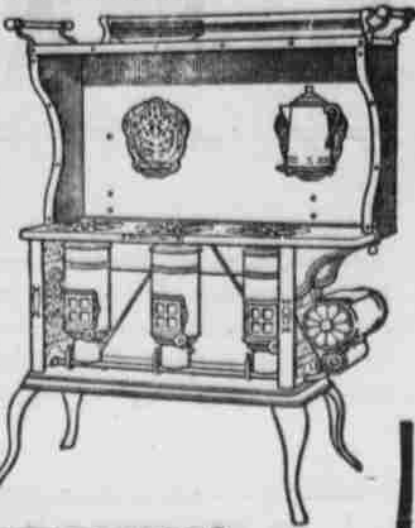

LUNATIC CAUSED A PANIC THREATENED TO EXPLODE BOMB IN CALIFORNIA BANK

[United Press Leased Wire.] Redwood City, Cal., May 27.—Voicing wild threats to drop a dynamite bomb on the tiled floor of the Redwood City National bank unless \$50,000 was paid him immediately, a dangerous escaped maniac from the state asylum at Agnews created a panic among a score of bank patrons yesterday. In a wild rush for the door several women were trampled by the terrified customers.

The lunatic wildly garbed and with a week's growth of beard on his face, entered the bank and made his way to the window of Assistant Cashier Frank Towne.

"I want \$50,000 at once. Give it to me or I'll blow up the place with a bomb," he shouted. "The public owes me money, and I'm going to get it."

The threatening demand was followed by a wild stampede for the doors. Patrons fought with one another in their efforts to get out of the building. Miss Mary Anne Gillis, a stenographer who saw the run from the opposite side of the street, believed a riot to be in progress, screamed for help and then fainted.

Cashier L. P. Behrens, coming from his private office in the rear of the bank, saved the situation. In an effort to temporize with the wild-eyed stranger he remarked diplomatically that the president of the bank was not in the building and that he alone had access to the vaults where the gold is kept. Meanwhile, Deputy Sheriff Norton, who had been summoned by one of the bank clerks, arrived and placed the maniac under arrest. A search of his clothing at the jail failed to bring to light explosives or weapons. An hour later a telephone message from the Agnews

asylum verified the belief of the authorities that the man was an escaped lunatic. He was returned to the asylum last night.

INLAND EMPIRE TO HAVE BUMPER CROP

[United Press Leased Wire.] Spokane, May 27.—Not for a decade have conditions in the Inland Empire looked more favorable for crops than at present. This is greatly due to the fact that in the grain belts the ground to a depth of from two to twelve inches is thoroughly soaked and that light showers, accompanied by sunshine, have been falling during the past few days. Reports from northeastern Oregon, northern Idaho and eastern Washington are of the most encouraging nature. They tell of the wheat standing better than it has for many years and that in one instance a field covering 200 acres runs from 35 to 50 stalks to the stool.

The acreage in northern Idaho is fully 30 per cent larger than it was last year, and it is reported from northeastern Oregon and eastern Washington that there the increase over last year will be from 10 to 30 per cent.

While there seems to be no way to accurately estimate the size of the coming crop, the farmers of the Snake river valley and the Idaho prairies venture to guess that this fall they will ship a strong 25,000,000 bushels of grain. In the Palouse and central Washington fields the growers declare that if the customary rains fall late in June they will ship at least 20,000,000 bushels.

Puget Sound Navy Yard, May 27. It is rumored here today that the cruiser St. Louis which is making ready to go to sea early next month will take President Taft and his party to Alaska this summer. The destination of the St. Louis is not officially known. A draft of 70 men was received yesterday from the cruiser Milwaukee. A like number of men were transferred from the cruiser Maryland which brought a contingent of men from the training station at San Francisco.

Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of Winter Street.

Notice is hereby given that the

Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve, and proposes to improve, at the expense of abutting and adjacent property, Winter street, in the City of Salem, Oregon, from the south line of State street to a point within 1 1/2 feet of the north rail of the railroad track of the Southern Pacific Co., where it crosses said Winter street at the intersection of Winter and Trade streets. The roadway of said portion of said street shall be improved the full width from curb to curb by grading the same and placing thereon a crushed rock improvement the full width from curb to curb, including the full intersection of Winter street where it intersects Winter street. The intersection of Winter and Trade streets from the north line of Trade street to a point 1 1/2 feet of the north rail of the railroad track of the Southern Pacific Co., shall be improved for a width of 29 1/2 feet on both sides of the center line of said Winter street excepting herefrom, however, a strip 7 feet in width extending full length of the proposed improvement to be occupied by the street railway track of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co., and improved by said company. Curb lines shall be established and said street shall be improved in every respect in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted therefor by the common council and on file in the office of the city recorder.

Remonstrances may be filed against said improvement in the manner and within the time provided in the charter of said city.

Remonstrances may be filed against said improvement in the manner and within the time provided in the Charter of said City.

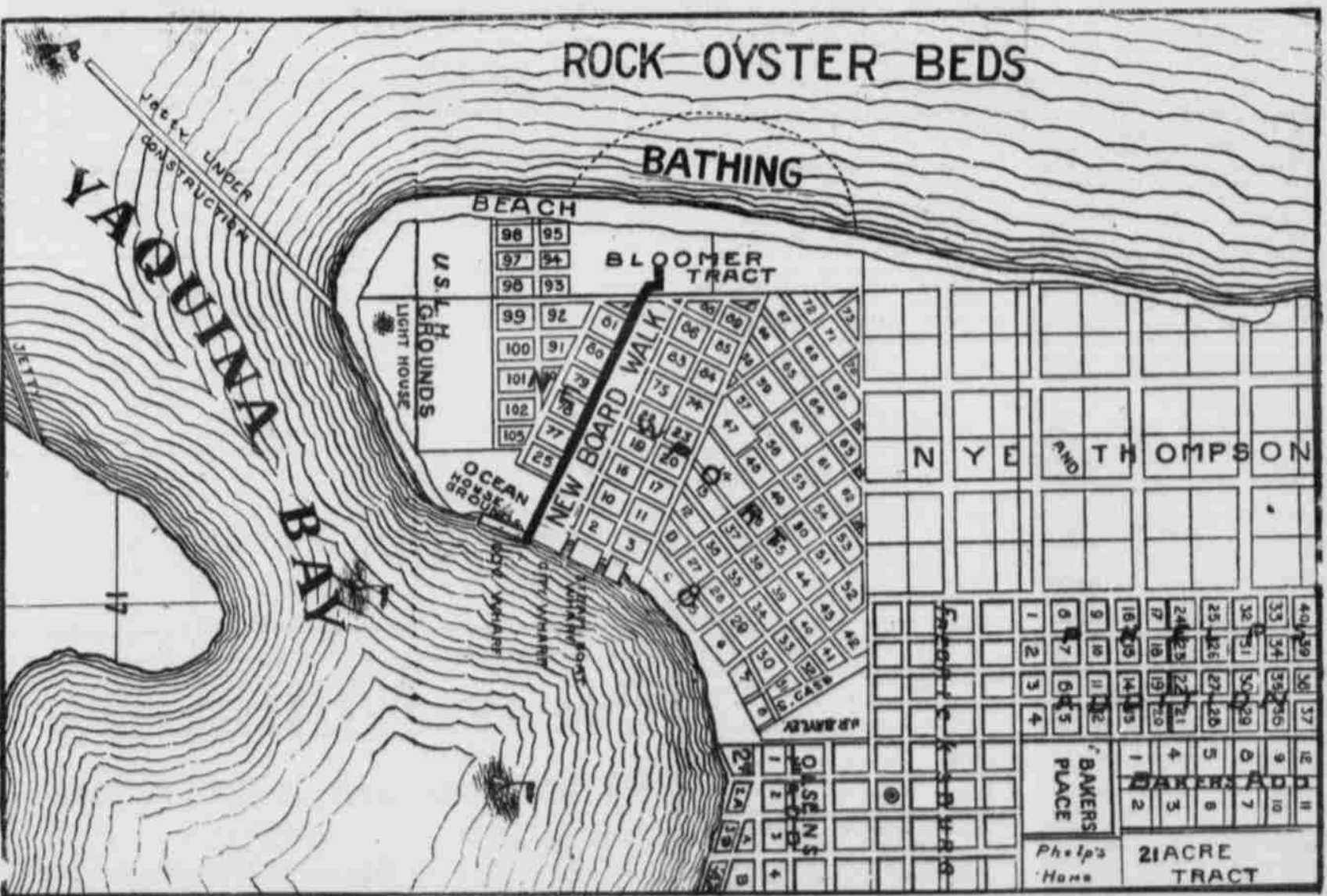
