FOUL-MOUTHED BRUTE LANDS IN THE JUG

Sheriff Harry Minto was called this morning to the residence of J. M. McAllister, three miles east of this city, to look after an individual who was bent on raising trouble with the lady of the house because she did not have a regular banquet prepared for him free of charge, just because he asked for it. The sheriff went to the place of trouble, but missed the man, whom, as he came into town, he saw walking down State street toward the city, and the sheriff quietly informed him that he was wanted, and it was very necessary that he come along with as little trouble as possible. The "ornery cuss," as the sheriff termed him, was taken before Justice of the Peace Webster for examination, but, upon arriving at that honorable destination, the man refused to give his name, and began to abuse the court and officers until the judge instructed the sheriff to lock him up, which was done without much ceremony.

Winn Drager was the first one to take immediate steps to put a stop to the fellow's actions, by phoning to Sheriff Minto. The man showed himself to be a very poor specimen of even an excuse for a man. When the lady of the McAllister home informed him that nothing was prepared, he began berating her unmercifully, and continued to use disgraceful language to the lady. He raved about for some time, throwing rocks at the house, and committing several other offenses before the sheriff took him in charge. Mrs. McAllister was frightened at the man, as he threatened to do the whole family bodily injury, and Mr. McAllister away from home.

About the only name the trouble-chaser can be called is not printable, and for his foolish actions at the McAllister home he will probably get the full benefit of the law. District Attorney C. L. McNary said today that three charges could be placed against the fellow, according to the statements made by those who have knowledge of the affair, and they are trespass, threatening harm and the defacing or destroying of property.
