LEWISTON IN DANGER FROM CLEAR WATER SNAKE RIVER RISING

[United Press Leased Wire.]

Lewiston, Idaho, May 29.—With the Snake river at this point rising gradually and the Clearwater stream on a rampage, people residing in this vicinity are preparing for the worst, for the sudden melting of snow at upper points would be followed by a flood that would do great damage.

The first span of the Holbrook Island bridge across the Clearwater slough, connecting this city with the ball grounds, has already been washed away. Engineer Darwin,

who was directing a number of men engaged in strengthening the structure, had a narrow escape from death as he was carried on the span several hundred feet down the stream before he approached near enough to the shore to jump.

The Snake river has risen more than two feet within the last 24 hours. The Clearwater has been rising rapidly for three days. Families whose homes are near the streams are preparing to move at the first sign of a flood.

MAY HAVE MURDERER OF ANNA POLTERA

San Francisco, May 29.—Believed to be the man who assaulted 6-year-old Myrtle Languertin, of this city, suspected of being the man who killed 9-year-old Anna Poltera in Los Angeles and identified as the man who this morning attempted to lure three little girls to a weed-covered lot at 17th and Castro streets, John J. Welch, an eccentric character, was arrested today.

He answers the description of the Los Angeles fiend who killed the little Poltera girl, and during the questioning by the detectives showed a remarkable knowledge of that crime, despite his claim that he could neither read nor write.

In Welch's pockets at the time of his arrest was a quantity of candy, a number of cheap trinkets, that would attract the eyes of youngsters, a paper of cayenne pepper and a bank book showing deposits of \$10,000 in the Hibernian and San Francisco Savings Union Banks.

Welch was captured by S. H. Flynn, of 138 Henry street, whose little girl, Laura, 13 years old, was one of the trio whom Welch, it is alleged, approached. Flynn's daughter,

with two little girls of the neighborhood, were on their way to a grocery store, when a man stopped them. The three fled from him.

The Flynn girl was the first to reach home, and her father, who formerly was a member of the police department, took her and went in search of the stranger. They found him at 16th and Castro streets leaning against a telegraph pole. To Flynn's questions Welch could not give satisfactory answers, and Flynn, impersonating a police officer, took him to headquarters.

Welch was clothed in rags. He wore blue overalls and a battered derby. The little Languertin girl and Frank Storms, who was with her, when the stranger enticed her into a basement, will be taken to police headquarters to see Welch. The Los Angeles authorities have been communicated with, and a photograph of Welch is now on its way to the southern city.

STREET CAR MEN STRIKE

**3,300 GO OUT, AND
SMALL RIOT STARTS
THIS MORNING**

Philadelphia, Pa., May 29.—Rioting and disorders throughout the city greeted the citizens today when they arose to find that a general strike of motormen and conductors went into effect at 4 o'clock this morning, and that two-thirds of the surface lines of the entire city were tied up.

A mob attacked a car on Girard avenue at Fifty-first street and stoned the passengers and crew. The windows of the car were smashed, and the car was badly damaged, but no one was seriously hurt. The motorman and conductor, who were the main objects of the missiles, succeeded in escaping.

Police reserves were rushed to the scene, and after a half hour of excitement, order was restored.

There are 4800 trolley employees in Philadelphia, and the union claims that 3300 belong to the organization.

The men now receive 31 cents an hour. They demand 25 cents an hour, and the privilege of buying their uniforms in the open market.

It is understood that the company will fight the strike in every way, though an effort has been made to bring about a meeting between the company officials and the union leaders.

Following a number of small riots the police took under consideration the closing of every section in the city. This action will undoubtedly be taken if there is any more trouble.

One arrest was made when a mob of 5000 persons attacked a car at Girard avenue and Fifty-fifth street. The crew was stoned and an attempt made to wreck the car, but the police dispersed the mob, taking into custody the ringleader.

Service throughout the city is irregular this afternoon and most of the central lines are stalled.

Rioting continued throughout the morning, one clash taking place at Sixteenth and Market streets, where 30 strikers drove the crew from a car.

THE CHERRY FAIR IS NOW ASSURED

A cherry fair for this year is undoubtedly assured. A preliminary skirmish has been made by the provisional finance committee, and donations are being made very liberally. It is proposed to have a big three-days' fair, as well as street entertainment, sports, games and all manner of amusements for the visitors. Since the Fourth of July proposition is eliminated, the contributions are coming liberally. Not only the business men and property owners in town are subscribing for the fair, but many of the fruit growers are liberally disposed, and the feeling among the committee is that a great fair can be held. Further meetings will be called early in the week, to put in motion the various details that go to make for the success of the fair.

The cherry fair proposition has given Salem more free advertising all over the U. S. than any other enterprise entered into by our city. The Dailies will not have a cherry fair this year, and it is more than ever conceded that Salem is the strongest cherry center in Oregon.

The cherry crop is not quite as heavy as last year, although, with the increased acreage, the value will probably be as large as ever. The lateness of the season may make it difficult to set the date for this year's fair, but it is now hoped that it can be held about the middle of July.
