"ANNE OF OLD SALEM" TOMORROW NIGHT

On Tuesday evening, June 1, the College of Oratory of Willamette University will present the three-act drama entitled "Anne of Old Salem." These annual plays are the crowning effort of the year, and are looked forward to, not only by the students and faculty, but by the town's people as well. Critics, who have seen the work of former years, have compared it to professional efforts. The work this year will be up to the usual standard, and anyone who is fortunate enough to be present will be well repaid. The cast has been carefully selected and thoroughly drilled, and is sure to make a hit.

The plays presented by the College of Oratory have never disappointed, and "Anne of Old Salem" promises to be the most delightful of all. The students have worked hard and the drill and rehearsals have been pressed to the limit under Miss Adams and Mrs. Savage. The cast is strong and letter-perfect in every part, and those who are at the opera house tomorrow night will see the strongest amateur play ever put on at Salem stage. The cast and a brief synopsis of the play is as follows:

Mr. Chester Catlow, who takes the leading role, takes the character of Roger Hardman in a very satisfactory manner, and interprets the difficult part with grace. His work showed up strong. Playing opposite Mr. Catlow is Miss Nellie Casabere, as Anne Ellinwell, the "Anne of Old Salem." It is around Anne that the story of the play revolves, and centers around her, and the power she is supposed to exert over the mind and heart of Roger Hardman, and in fact over all the youths of Salem.

Miss Casabere takes the part of the accused Anne in such a way as to bring tears to the eyes, especially when Cotten Mather, in his zeal to suppress witchcraft, shows her the rope with which the witches are hung. At other times she portrays, especially at first, before suspicions are actively aroused, the blithe-hearted Anne in a very pleasing and delightful way. It seems a pity that such a sweet girl as Anne could be subjected to such suspicions, to such accusations, as the pretty and winning Anne is subjected. In the uncharitableness of those around her are brought some of the strongest and most pathetic scenes.

The play opens with Anne's mother (June Paitt) trying to gather up enough money to pay the rent, which is due. The sum they have is not half sufficient, so to raise the required amount Anne's ring is sold to Ezekiel Brown (Perry Reigelman) the village flirt. When Mistress Hardman (Myrtle Hannon) comes for the rent it is proffered her, but she refuses to take it until she sees it counted and knows where it has come from, because she knew that they did not have sufficient funds the day before to pay. She is told that it came from the depths of the earth, that fire has tried it and that tears had cooled it. She gets suspicious and suggests witchcraft, and starts the fatal suspicion. Roger Hardman (Chester Catlow) who has practically been betrothed to Anne two years previous, and who had been sent to England by his mother, so that he would forget her, returns and finds the ring gone from Anne's finger, and demands to know what has become of it. Anne, not daring to tell the relation she has borne to his mother (that of servant) practically cannot explain where the ring is gone. Roger then finds the ring on Ezekiel's finger and the troubles begin. Things get most complicated, and only at the command of the governor of Massachusetts is the case against Anne dropped. The affair of the ring is explained, Ezekiel, the flirt, gets caught at last, Mistress Hardman repents her wicked work, and everything ends happily.
