# ANNIS WOMAN SCORES

## PRURIENT PUBLIC FLOCKS TO SEE HER

[United Press Leased Wire.]  
New York, May 31.—Forced by financial difficulties to make capital of her recent misfortune and to the publicity attached thereto, Mrs. William E. Annis, whose husband was killed by Captain Peter C. Hains, today is a full-fledged vaudeville actress. She made her first public appearance in a music hall at Rockaway Beach yesterday, and scored a distinct success.

Mrs. Annis said today that her decision to go on the stage was the result of the necessity to provide for her two sons, Howard, 11 years old, and William, 7, who are students in a military academy at Flushing. She will appear next in Baltimore, and then return to New York, where she is booked for a roof garden theatre.
