THE MISSISSIPPI GETS SILVER SERVICE

Scranton, Miss., June 1.—Wind, resulting in a choppy sea, caused a reversal of the plans for the ceremonies today attendant upon the presentation by the state of a silver service to the battleship Mississippi.

The ceremonies commenced at 10:30 o'clock this morning. Governor Edmund F. Noel of Mississippi delivered the presentation address, Captain Fremont responding upon behalf of the ship and the men.

Governor Jared Y. Sanders of Louisiana and John Sharp Williams participated in the ceremonies.

All ceremonies took place on shore and unless the sea subsides before night it is probable that no attempt will be made to transfer the silver to the ship. In that event it will be taken to Philadelphia and taken aboard there without formality.

The waves were so high that the officers of the battleship were brought ashore with difficulty. They made the trip in whale boats as many were so badly drenched that they were forced to appear at the casino at Anderson part in civilian attire.

A ball game and reception are planned this afternoon for the entertainment of the crew and a banquet and reception will be tendered.

RETAIL GROCERS ON THE WAY TO PORTLAND

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, June 1.—Several hundred delegates to the national convention of retail grocers are on their way to Portland today to attend the meeting of the association, after being elaborately entertained here.

Delegates from the East joined the California delegation here yesterday, and were the guests at a banquet in the red room of the Fairmont Hotel. After the feast the entire company started for Portland, where the convention convenes tomorrow.

Among the distinguished men in the party is National Director Chas. G. Fuller, of Boston, and J. R. Newberry, of Los Angeles, head of the Southern California delegation.

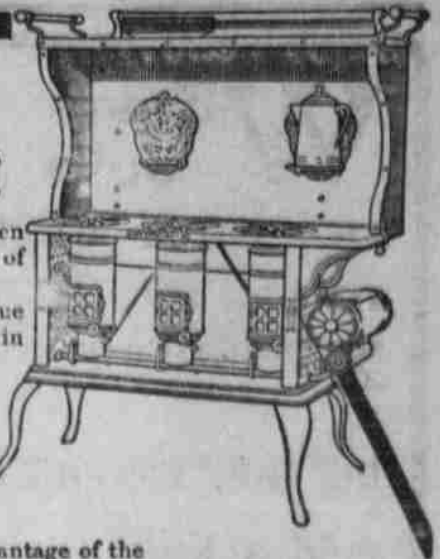
