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JULIUS WILL REQUIRE BARGE FOR HER EXTRAS

The stern-wheel ship "Julius," which was tied up in the city recently by the government inspecting agents, owing to the owners being negligent in equipping the craft with the many necessary articles provided by law and the United States Marine Commission, is being inspected today by the officers from Portland, who were notified that the boat was ready to be again taken out, if it can pass inspection. Rube Cummins, one of the owners of the "Julius," went over the ship yesterday, and took a careful inventory of her belongings, and the following new equipment were set down for the inspection officers' examination: Two licensed men to run the boat, an engineer and pilot, the water wheel made reversible, what is known as a gong and jingle for signaling purposes to the engine room, a speaking tube, fog and signal horn, a fog bell, several feet of hose, a force pump throwing water 60 feet,

several yards of rope, two saws, two axes, one hammer, innumerable life preservers, a pick and shovel, and all steering apparatus, name "Julius" painted in several conspicuous places, license papers tacked up in plain sight and a marine rule book. Inspection officers will probably not hold Mr. Cummins' outgoing vessel out any longer, and the "Julius" will be seen throwing the spray from her bows while on the 40-mile-per-hour trips up the Willamette to the shores of much sand and gravel. However, Mr. Cummins is a little nervous yet in regard to the boat's equipment and the visit of the inspection officers, as he has failed to secure a "cullud gongmen" porter, state rooms are without hot and cold water and baths, the elevator is out of kilter, and the feed trough is shy four waitresses. He will probably get busy and install these forgotten articles before the inspection officer leaves the city.

CHINA WANTS TO BORROW MILLIONS FOR RAILROADS

New York, June 2.—Discovery today that the real mission of the Chinese special envoy, Tang Shao Li, and his party, who spent several weeks at Washington last February, was to borrow \$100,000,000 for the Szechuen railroad, created a stir in Wall street today.

It is understood that negotiations are now in progress between a group of American financiers, headed by J. P. Morgan, and the Chinese promoters for the conclusion of the gigantic loan as soon as the Chinese government gives authority for the final arrangement.

The envoys, when they arrived last February, announced that they came to the United States to thank President Roosevelt for his liberality in remitting the Boxer indemnity. The envoys established a mansion at Washington and subsequent incidents indicated that they had some other mission here besides the one made public.

Elihu Root, then secretary of state, told Tang that America did not care to assist foreign countries for political purposes but that if proper assurances were given the state department would so assure the American financiers.

This assurance from the Chinese government is expected within a short time and it is thought that the loan will be arranged soon.

SAN FRANCISCO POST BOUGHT BY GLOBE

San Francisco, June 2.—The Globe this afternoon announces the purchase by its owners of the Evening Post, an afternoon paper established about 35 years ago by the late Henry George. Recently it has been published by Thomas Garrett.

S. Fred Hogue, president of the Ocean Publishing Company, publisher of the Globe, succeeds Garrett as president of the Evening Post Publishing Company. The Post was published today under the new management.

The two papers will be published with the same general policies as those of the Globe. No announcement was made as to when they will

be consolidated. The details of the consolidation have not been worked out as yet.

S. Fred Hogue came to San Francisco from Los Angeles to assume charge of the Globe, when the Ocean Publishing Company purchased the paper from the Calkins' Syndicate, by which the Globe was established last summer.

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DR. CUSICK HAS DOUBTS AS TO SMITH'S SANITY

Dr. W. A. Cusick, one of the commission to examine Smith as to his sanity, gives The Capital Journal the following authorized statements as to his view of this case:

"My regard for the skill and good judgment of a majority of the board of medical examiners, appointed to ascertain the mental condition of Byron Smith, causes me to regret that we cannot fully agree in an interpretation of his present mental status. Owing to our defective laws, as it relates to the criminally insane, the tenure of their confinement, being so uncertain, and with a full recognition of the further fact that it is unsafe for the public for him to be at large, he will most likely be brought into court, tried and convicted of a felony. There are some delicate questions relating to probable preservation of brain function, which lead me to the belief that there are even chances that he will bring up in the insane asylum at some time in the future."

"A long sentence in the asylum (if that were possible) seems to me to be consistent with the ends of justice and prudent procedure, in view of the mental and physical conditions which seem to obtain in his case."

Dr. Cusick is probably the best authority on mental diseases in this part of the state. He was consulting physician at the state insane asylum for many years.

CONFESSES TO ATTACK ON LAZARUS FAMILY

Vallejo, Cal., June 2.—George Spring, charged with a brutal assault upon F. Lazarus and his wife at Sausalito, today confessed his guilt to Sheriff Taylor. The confession revealed a plot to rob the couple which Spring alleges was outlined by Vallie Tarpy, an acquaintance of Mrs. Lazarus' sister, Mrs. Wharton.

According to the story told by Spring, the men secured \$90 in coin and a gold watch. Tarpy, who is in jail here, denied Spring's accusation and protested his innocence.

Spring said today that he met Tarpy in a Fillmore street resort in San Francisco, and that Tarpy told him he had a job for him in Sausalito. Saturday evening, he alleged, the men went to the Lazarus home

and hid beneath the bed occupied by the couple. Lazarus and his wife entered the room and were preparing to retire when they were attacked. With a heavy blackjack one of the thugs beat Lazarus into insensibility, ripping his scalp nearly off his head. Mrs. Lazarus fainted, falling beside the unconscious body of her husband. The robbers secured their booty and escaped before neighbors, aroused by Mrs. Lazarus' screams, arrived.

Mrs. Lazarus stated today that Tarpy had known Mrs. Wharton some time and that she thinks that he learned of the money in the house through her.

COLORADO THREATENS NEEDLES SWEEPING AWAY BANKS AND STILL RISING

Needles, Cal., June 2.—With 175 feet of bank between the town and the Colorado river today, and with the bank being eaten away at the rate of 35 feet in nine hours, property owners here are working desperately building a breakwater to save the town.

To increase their alarm, word has been received from the headwaters of the Colorado which indicates a steady rise of the river south of Grand Canyon. It is predicted that the river will be nearly two feet higher in the vicinity of Needles by tomorrow.

It was thought in the earlier part of the season that there would be little additional damage done by the river, swollen by melting snow in the mountain. The sudden increase in bank-cutting, however, has caused alarm.

The Indian mission, El Bethel, is in the path of the river's bank-cutting, and several residences of considerable value stand near it.

ROOSEVELT SEEKS NEW HUNTING GROUNDS
