EXPERT SAYS AIRSHIPS OF NO PRACTICAL VALUE

San Francisco, June 2.—Count Zeppelin's record of 850 miles in his aircraft caused the expression today of dissenting opinions by local students of aeronautics. Roy Knabenschue, exponent of the dirigible balloon method of aerial navigation, lauds Zeppelin's performance as the most remarkable in the records of aerial navigation. Professor George Davidson, of the University of California, student of aeronautics for more than a quarter of a century, decries the dirigible craft, and avers that its uncertainty precludes its practicability.

"The aeroplane is restricted," said Knabenschue, "and it is artificial all true. In it an extended flight is impossible. More than two men cannot travel safely in one. I regard Zeppelin's feat as remarkable, and think it means more than the work

of all other aviators put together. "I am going to have a big dirigible airship, similar to Zeppelin's. It will cost \$150,000, and I hope to have it built the first of the coming year."

Davidson is firm in his advocacy of the aeroplane.

"I don't see how the dirigible balloon ever can have any commercial value," he said. "It is too uncertain, and the difficulties attending its use in war are too great to be overcome. Zeppelin is a matter of national pride with the Germans, that's why he is encouraged. The other day he landed in a pear tree. Everything he has done has been attended with disaster. Handling the aeroplane, while a delicate matter, is not the formidable task that it is with the immense Zeppelin ship. I think that the useful aircraft of the future will be the aeroplane."

"DAD" WAKES HIM FROM LOVE'S YOUNG DREAM

San Francisco, June 2.—Carroll Webster, 19 years of age, son of Robert Webster, an Alaskan millionaire, today is steaming northward aboard the steamship Umatilla with his determined father. In San Francisco, longingly awaiting the far-off day of his return, is pretty 17-year-old Alice Quinlan, graduate of Notre Dame of San Jose, and daughter of the wealthy W. S. Quinlan of this city. Carroll and Alice are in love.

Webster senior is of the opinion that the young people are too young to marry, and he is taking no chances. Upon the father's order, the youthful lover made his way sorrowfully to the docks yesterday. Miss Quinlan was with him. A final plea to be permitted to remain in San Francisco was set aside by the stern destroyer of youthful happiness, and the lad was bundled aboard the ship.

Seattle, June 2.—The Arctic Brotherhood's building on the A.-Y.-P. grounds was formally dedicated today and at the same time the ceremonies attending Behring Sea day at the exposition were held. The Behring Sea celebration was scheduled for 9 o'clock this morning but the failure of some people to arrive caused the postponement until this afternoon.

The feature of the ceremony was an address by President Chilberg. A reception was held in the Arctic Brotherhood building during the afternoon and a ball will be held there this evening. Several hundred residents of the Seward peninsula were present at the ceremonies today.
