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CLOSING EXERCISES
AT DEAF--MUTE SCHOOL

The closing exercises of the State Deaf Mute School were held at that institution yesterday afternoon. Miss Grace Smith, of Aurora, and Miss Ruth Thomas, of Portland, receiving diplomas. Many of the parents and friends of the pupils attended. The usual display of work was omitted this year, it having been sent to the A.-Y.-P. exposition, where it can be seen at the Oregon building. The pupils have spent much time in preparing this exhibit, which represents the industrial and also the literary side of the school, including essays, drawing, furniture, harness, etc. There are now 78 students, who will be given examinations this week, and will leave next Wednesday for their homes in various parts of the state to spend the summer.

The splendid results that are being obtained through intelligent training, and the most up-to-date methods was demonstrated in the oral exercises by a class of 11. All of these Superintendent Tillagast stated were unable to make any audible sound when entering the school, but, by the most patient training, are now able to read so that most of their

words can be understood. A few of these students can hear, but for the others the ability to speak has been obtained through artificial methods. The pupils are first taught the sign language the elements of speech through lip reading, and then to make sounds.

Mrs. Walters, of Salem, sang "The Holy City," and it was interpreted in the sign language by Ruth Thomas, Grace Kau and Fay Newth. The salutatory essay, "Oregon," by Ruth Thomas, and the valedictory essay, "Rev. Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet," by Grace Smith, given in the sign language, were interpreted by Superintendent Tillagast. An Indian club drill was executed with perfect unison by six pupils of the kindergarten class and a recitation, "Oregon," by one of the instructors was interpreted by signs by Daisy Hostetter, Erma Maynard and Annie Schulz. Rev. H. T. Babcock, in the absence of Superintendent Ackerman, addressed the graduates and presented their diplomas. The program closed with "America," signed by the entire school, led by Pearl Orwig, Ruth Thomas, Grace Kau and Ruby Westfall.

WILL BE A HOT ONE

Olympia, Wash., June 3.—When the special session of the legislature, just called by Governor Hay, meets here June 23, it is expected that it will mark the beginning of one of the hottest meetings of the people's law-makers ever held here. This is indicated in various ways.

While the legislators are called together primarily for the purpose of impeaching Insurance Commissioner Schively, many questions that have kept the pot boiling in state politics for some time will come up for serious consideration.

Some time may be taken on the new criminal code. No one who is familiar with the situation doubts that two steps such as these will create enough trouble to supply the ordinary session.

Then, again, it is expected that Governor Hay will try to slip through his legislative amendment, providing that all state elective offices shall be abolished and filled by men appointed by the chief executive. It is well known that the liquor interests for some time have been working several kinds of schemes to win their fight against local option at the special session, which has been looked to for the past few weeks. The school authorities will also be on hand in their war paint to protest against several sections of the new school code.

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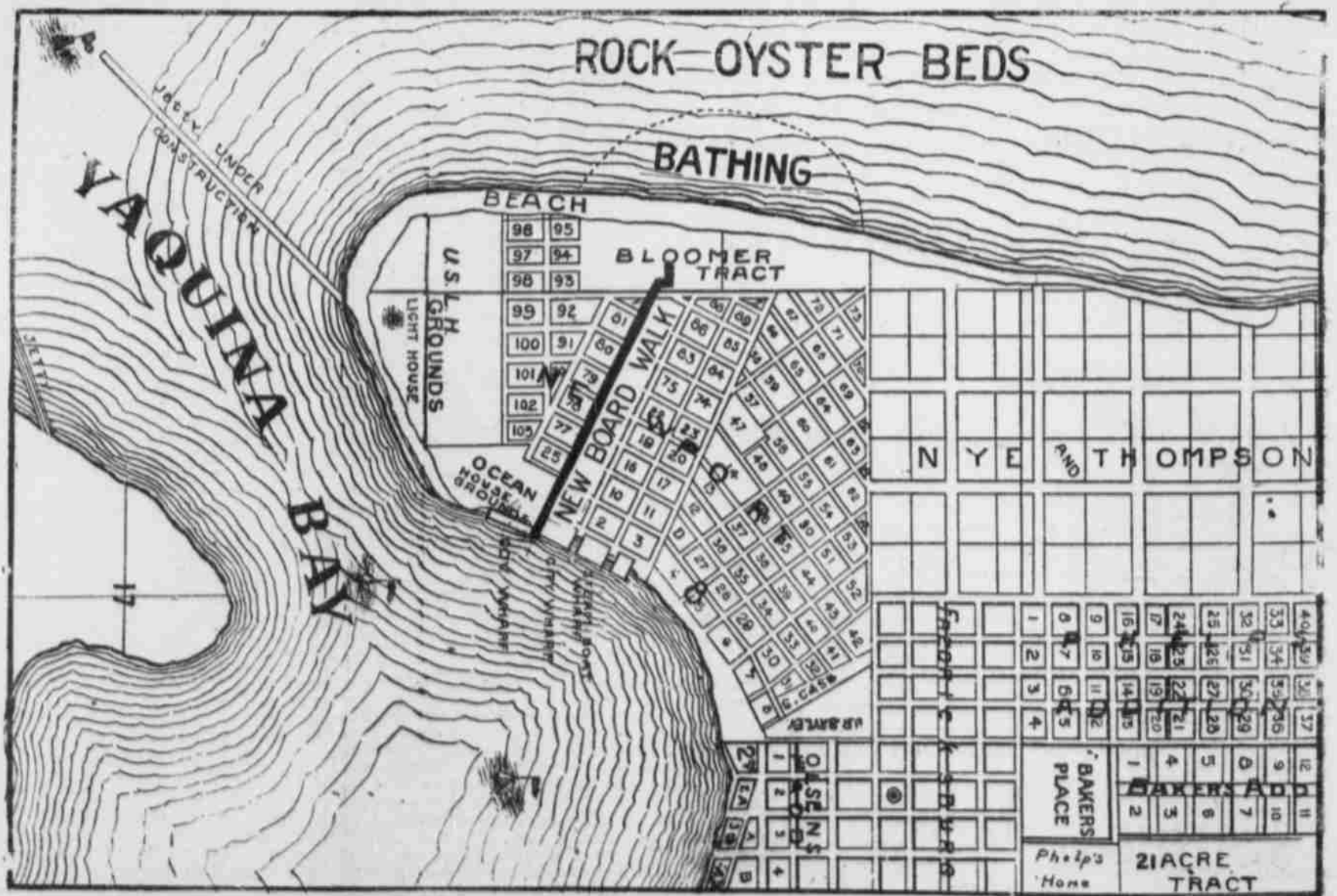
