STRIKE AT ABERDEEN HELPS BOOM HOQUIAM

Boston, June 5.—Five men were killed and four men seriously wounded today by John Murphy, aged 50 years, who ran amuck this afternoon at a Somerville packing plant where he was employed.

Murphy went suddenly insane and brandishing a big knife cornered Thomas C. Crowe, whom he murdered. Two Italians and two negroes were the other victims fatally stabbed. The nine victims were removed to a hospital but five of them died soon after their arrival.
Murphy is under arrest pending an examination into his sanity.

WILL STOP BETTING ON COLORADO RACES

Denver, Colo., June 5.—Governor John S. Shaforth announced today that he would use the power of state to stop betting on horse races in Colorado.

Race track men have decided to test the anti-gambling law at minor meets in suburbs of Denver and see what action the governor takes there. John Condon of Chicago has a lease on the Denver track, but will not attempt to hold a meet there if the governor stops the suburban races.

Athletic Union Meet

The first annual meet of the Marion County Athletic Union will be held in Hubbard on July 12, when the winning baseball team from the south end of the county will play with the north end winners. Also other events, consisting of foot races, broad jumps, high jumps, pole vaulting and shot-put, will be indulged in by representatives from the different county schools. At the schools in the county will take part in the meet and a large crowd is expected to be present.

AMERICANS JOIN

(Continued from Page 1.)
In as deputy sheriffs. Lumber camp No. 2 is closed, the laborers having struck as soon as they heard of the arrival of the detectives.
The other workers in the camp were forced to quit, but did not do so willingly, according to latest reports. The skilled workmen in the camps are also holding the presence of the detectives as grounds for a strike. The men are guarding all the property of the company. Monday is considered to be the most critical day during the strike. Then the forces will be concentrated in one mill and the work resumed at capacity. It is reported here that strike breakers from San Francisco will be brought here to begin work on that day. The hostile attitude of the American workmen has complicated matters unexpectedly. The militia is also opposed to the detectives, having been put in their power. The officers are united in their opposition to such a condition and have voiced their complaint to Sheriff Howard.
From today's developments the strike will be one of the largest in the history of California lumbering. Over 15,000 men will be out. The cost to the lumber company is estimated at \$25,000 per day. Great expense is also incurred in maintaining the army of detectives and deputies.
The Italians have refused to return to work and nearly 100 left McClelland today to seek employment in southern California.
At a conference yesterday afternoon President J. H. Queal absolutely refused to increase wages. He has agreed, however, to purchase their cabins at a fair appraisement and the \$900 latins will leave the town. The situation which is expected to culminate Monday has been evolving for several years, since the McClelland Lumber Company purchased the plant. The workmen complained that the company pays too little to its workmen. Conditions, they claim, have constantly grown more galling. Americans have gone about this movement quietly, carrying it on while the Italians have been commanding the attention of the company. There is much sympathy here for the strikers. Nearly \$50,000 was withdrawn from the company's bank today by Italians who left for other work. The entire \$207,000 which the Italians have deposited here will be withdrawn next week.
