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CALIFORNIA LUMBER TRUST IS BACK OF M'CLOUD COMPANY

COMMANDER OF MILITIA GUEST OF PRESIDENT OF THE MILL CO-- ITALIANS ARE LEAVING AND COMPANY IS SCOURING COUNTRY FOR MILL HANDS

McCloud, Cal., June 7.—Evidence of an agreement among the lumber men of California affecting 30,000 laborers and one hundred million dollars worth of property was given to the public today as the reason for the McCloud Lumber Company refusing to grant the increase to the strikers. President J. H. Quel has said openly that he could not consider an increase as all the lumber companies had agreed that they would not pay more for their labor.

An unverified statement has been made here to the effect that the lumber "trust" of California is sharing with the McCloud company the loss the latter has sustained during this strike, which amounts to several hundred thousand dollars.

President Quel refuses to verify this report but does not deny it. The decision to not grant the increase asked by the Italians was reached at a conference here Saturday night between President G. X. Wendling of the California Pine Box Company of

San Francisco; Superintendent E. C. Evans of the Weed Lumber Company and President Quel.

They discouraged Quel's inclination to grant the demands for a 25-cent raise. Such weakening, they held, would injure every lumber company in the state and in the west, offering a strong excuse for strikes in other camps. The lumbermen are determined to restrict this movement to McCloud and are willing to contribute to the loss that the dissatisfaction may not spread, and no precedent for an increase be established. General Consul Salvatore Rocca of San Francisco is here today awaiting a settlement of the Italians' affairs. This is the first time in the history of the state that a foreign power has intervened in a labor dispute. The precedent was established only at the request of Governor J. N. Gillett and the strikers. As soon as the consul had opened his room in the hotel representatives of both interests requested audiences. This was the first concession President Quel has made in recognition of the

striking forces. The consul had refused for diplomatic reasons the accommodations of the Quel home offered him. Later in the day he refused to return the call of Adjutant General Lauck because that officer was quartered with the lumber president. Official amities were finally arranged by a meeting at the militia camp.

The appraisal of the Italians' cabins continues today. The deposits have been drawn from the bank. The sum to the credit of the Latins has shrunk from \$207,000 to \$34,000 upon investigation, the bank report also showing that the Italians annually send \$53,000 to Italy from this town. The men will leave tomorrow. Many have made this camp their home for ten years and hold a deep attachment for it. A few Italians returned to work today under heavy guard. The five leaders under arrest will probably be discharged if the settlement is concluded today. They are held under \$1000 bail each. The strikebreakers did not arrive as expected and the mills are shut down. The company has several scouts through the country enlisting men to come here.

TO MAKE ALASKA INTO TERRITORY

Washington, D. C., June 7.—Delegated Wickersham, of Alaska, today introduced in the house a resolution providing for an executive assembly for the territory of Alaska.

The bill provides for the location of the territorial capital at Juneau. The legislative body suggested would consist of an upper and a lower house, the upper house to be composed of two territorial senators and the lower house of four representatives for each judicial district. The first session, if the bill is acted upon favorably by the house and senate, will be held in 1910. The sessions, according to precedent established, would be biennial, and limited to 60 days.

Wickersham's bill was referred to the house committee on territories.

WOMAN HAD MORE GRIT THAN THE MEN

San Francisco, Cal., June 7.—Wrecked and snowbound on one of the desolate Aleutian islands, Mrs. J. S. Cameron, bride of the first mate of the ship Columbia, cheered and kept from despair, the crew and passengers of the ill-fated vessel by singing the songs she learned when a girl in Melbourne.

Twenty-nine members of the Columbia's crew, accompanied by the mate and his father, Captain J. H. Cameron, arrived yesterday on the Pacific Coast steamer Governor Mrs. Cameron who belittles the part she played in keeping up the courage of the suffering men during a fearful night of exposure in the snow and ice on the beach, is the heroine of every man of the crew.

Bound for the salmon canneries on Bristol Bay, the Columbia was driven ashore near Unimak Pass, the night of April 25. Mrs. Cameron and her husband were on their honeymoon, and she was the only woman aboard the vessel. The men of the crew and the passengers were taken ashore in the boats. Their garments were soaked by spray and frozen to their bodies. They spent a terrible night wandering aimlessly on the beach.

Cheerful and hopeful, despite the fearful hardships she had undergone, the mate's bride went among the men cheering them by song, and urging them on their search for shelter.

After hours of tramping through a blinding snow storm, they stumbled on a deserted shack, where they huddled. Then they tramped over the snow to the Scotch Cap lighthouse, eight miles away.

CONGRESSMEN WANT TO VISIT SEATTLE

Washington, D. C., June 7.—President Taft will visit San Francisco to participate in the Portola celebration in October, if his official duties will permit. In a conference with Senator Flint, of California, today, the President displayed great interest in the coming celebration, and said that, if possible, he will be in San Francisco October 19, the opening day.

In response to the invitation issued by the officials of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition at Seattle, Representative William A. Rodenburg, of Illinois, today introduced a resolution in the house empowering the speaker to appoint an official committee of 15 representatives to attend the big fair.

The opening of the Portland Flower Festival today was the occasion of an official telegram from President Taft to the city of Portland, congratulating its citizens upon their enterprise, and expressing his best wishes for the success of the festival.

FORTY CHICAGOANS VISIT SEATTLE BUT ALI BABA NOT THERE

Seattle, Wash., June 7.—This is "Chicago day" at the A. Y. P. exposition, and a large number of Chicagoans are celebrating the occasion in an energetic manner. A delegation of 40 business men from the Windy City, who have been making a tour of the Pacific Northwest cities, paraded through the grounds at 1 o'clock this afternoon, and afterward joined their brethren from the Windy City in celebrating.

The Oregon Agricultural College cadets, 450 strong, who arrived at the exposition yesterday, and are camped on the grounds of the University of Washington, are today taking in the sights of the exposition. Late this afternoon they will parade through the grounds. The cadets will be here until June 10.

SHOT WHILE WAITING TRIAL FOR MURDER

St. Louis, Mo., June 7.—Fred Mohrie was shot and killed in the Four Courts building today, while waiting to be tried on a charge of having killed Constable Sam Young in a neighborhood feud.

He was standing in the corridor smoking, when he was shot by an unknown man who made his escape. The assassin is supposed to have been a friend of Young's.

Thomas W. Kane, a deputy constable, was arrested this afternoon and charged with the shooting.

Mohrie was under indictment of second degree murder. His attorneys warned him that it was not safe to leave the courtroom but he wanted to smoke and insisted that he be allowed to step into the corridor. He was in the act of rolling a cigarette when shot. The wound was fatal and he died on the way to the hospital.

COMMISSIONER HOFF DISCOVERS STATE PRINTING OFFICE

BUT ONLY WHEN ITS LOCATION WAS POINTED OUT TO HIM BY THE CAPITAL JOURNAL-- ORDERS FLY WHEELS ETC CASED UP

Today Labor Commissioner O. P. Hoff, for the first time in many years, inspected the state printing office, and decided that the fast presses running there day and night should be cased up around the pulleys, and fly-wheels, that are all down on the floor, where an employee is liable to be caught at any time. He notified the state printer, and Mr. Dunaway will probably comply. Taking five dollars inspection fees from little country printing offices, that run a press a few hours in the week, and exempt large plants that are making thousands of dollars a month, is the

grand record made for a number of years by Labor Commissioner Hoff. The prodding of the Capital Journal has had a good effect on that official, and he should now make the state printer pay his back fees, and enforce the law on a printer who is able to pay, and runs presses that should come under the factory inspection act, which should be enforced wherever there is any dangerous machinery running at a high rate of speed. The Portland Labor Press will please take notice, and also the Salem Statesman, that have printed only Mr. Hoff's statements of his official conduct.

HENEY HEALER DROPS GUN IN COURTROOM

San Francisco, June 7.—A heavy Colts revolver that dropped from the pocket of Jack McCarthy, one of Heney's bodyguards, and fell among the attorneys, created a sensation in the Calhoun trial today. McCarthy sprang to regain his weapon, and the startled lawyers leaped to their feet.

Picking up the gun, McCarthy mumbled an apology to the bench and resumed his seat behind the special prosecutor. The excited attorneys returned to their places, and the proceedings were continued.

Samuel E. Scott, a detective formerly in the employ of Special Agent William J. Burns, was called to the witness stand today. For more than two hours Attorney Stanley Moore, for the defense, tried to confuse Scott, and to impeach his testimony. Interruptions by counsel for the prosecution were frequent, and Heney's periodically stated objections precipitated several lively tilts between him and Moore. Moore's effort to make Scott contradict the testimony given last week met with failure.

IT IS WHISKEY ONLY IF MADE FROM GRAIN

Washington, June 7.—Lloyd W. Bowers, of the department of justice, to whom Taft referred the interpretation of the pure food law, with regards to whiskey, made his report today.

Boyer held that whiskey is whiskey, if it is made from grain. If it is made from potatoes, apple plants, corn stalks, chips or any other thing the liquor derived is not whiskey.

The President will allow the whiskey makers to reply to Boyer's report before rendering a decision in the matter.

MRS EDDY SETS AT REST FALSE RUMORS

Boston, June 7.—Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy at Cheshut Hill, Mass., today gave the United Press a signed statement addressed "To Whom it May Concern." The statement says:

"I have the pleasure to report to one and all of my beloved friends and followers that I exist in the flesh and am seen daily by the members of my household and those who have appointments with me.

"Above all this foolishness, either denying or asserting the personality or presence of Mary Baker G. Eddy, stands the eternal fact of Christian Science and the history of its discovery and founder. It is sufficient evidence that the discoverer of an eternal truth cannot be a temporal fraud."

The statement concludes with a reference to the prosperity of Christian Science throughout the world, and says:

"We know all things work together

for good to them that serve God, to them who are called according to his purpose."

The statement was given out at Cheshut Hill on behalf of Mrs. Eddy by one of her attendants, the head of the Christian Scientists keeping her word given two years ago that she would never again allow herself to be publicly interviewed.

Later Mrs. Eddy directed that a number of representatives be allowed to enter her home at Brooklyn. They were not allowed to ask her any questions, simply being given the privilege of watching Calvin Frye, a servant who has been in her employ for years, escort her to her carriage. Mrs. Eddy was apparently aware of what was happening but the reporters noted that she was more feeble than she was two years ago. After she departed the servants showed the reporters through the home.
