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WOMEN AND CHILDREN DROWNED

New Orleans, La., June 7.—Nine persons lost their lives when a pier at Mandeville, a resort on the North Shore of Lake Ponchartraine, collapsed last night, according to advices received here today. Most of the victims of the disaster were women and children. Ten bodies have been recovered, and the lake is being dragged in an effort to locate the rest.

One hundred and fifty excursionists were on the pier when it collapsed. The wharf was a frail structure and could not sustain its heavy burden. When the steamer Margaret, which was to return the excursionists to New Orleans, was about to leave, the pier fell to pieces, hurling its occupants into eight feet of water. Most of the men had little difficulty in escaping, and the victims were helpless women and little children.

Fifteen persons were seriously injured and 40 slightly hurt. A special grand jury was called today to fix the responsibility for the accident.

The wharf was the property of the New Orleans and St. Tammany Railroad Company.

It is considered possible that officers of the steamer which caused the collapse of the wharf will be indicted, as witnesses of the tragedy declare the vessel was coming at full speed and struck the piling with great force.

Of the 400 persons on the wharf more than 100 were thrown into the water. Work of rescue began immediately. Life boats were lowered from the Margaret and the life preservers thrown overboard to the persons struggling in the water. Seventy-five persons were picked up, many of them in a serious condition, and all but 19 of the rest managed to get ashore by themselves within 10 minutes after the accident occurred.

MODERN WOODMEN CELEBRATE

The annual picnic held by the Modern Woodmen of America in Silverton last Saturday was conceded to be the most successful ever arranged by that order, there being in the neighborhood of 4000 people in attendance from all parts of the country. The monster crowd was taken care of in an orderly and comfortable manner, and all seemed to enjoy themselves immensely.

The parade was several blocks long and started from the depot and went through the city to the picnic grounds, which are a beautiful grove a short distance from Silverton. The long procession was well planned, and the decorations were beautiful, there being 10 floats, each bearing a queen. After the parade had reached the picnic ground, mayor of Silverton, L. Rauch, delivered a fitting address of welcome, and the drill contests then took place. Teams representing Salem, Woodburn, Portland and Silverton, consisting of men only competing. The Woodburn team won the silver cup for the men's drill, and later the ladies of Silverton captured the women's drill and silver cup. Woodburn also got the cup for the most appropriate and best arranged float.

Many thought the cup should have been given to the Salem float, however, as the committee on decorations, Mrs. W. W. Hill and J. A. Bernardi, were very original and artistic in their selection of decorations, and the Salem float received much favorable comment in the parade. Miss Agnes West proved to be "the" queen in every respect. Along with the queen on the float were Gladys Dimmer and Opal Corey.
