NEWPORT BEACHES

Henry Workman and C. H. Buckner left today for Newport beach, where they will run a four-horse carryall and 12 saddle horses all summer for the convenience of the public. They have scoured the valley for the best saddle horses that money can buy, have fine rigs and a tent 34x64 in which to keep them. They will buy a corral of feed at Corvallis on the way over. They have a fine set of matched bays for their four-in-hand, and the very best of equipment, and are pretty good men to deal with themselves. They will also keep horses for other people, who want stable room during the season. Travel for the beaches will begin early this year, and it will be the biggest season Newport ever had.

CHARGE THAT SCHIVELY
TOOK ALL HE COULD GET

Spokane, Wash., June 7.—It developed today that the "sliding scale" of fees charged newly organized insurance companies by Insurance Commissioner Schively will form the basis of the impeachment proceedings against him at the coming special session of the legislature.

George Lee, assistant attorney-general, is authority for this announcement. He said today that on Schively's alleged system of charging insurance companies as much as they would give will be based the charges of extortion to be made against him.

"From 75 out of about 300 insurance companies, with whom Schively conducted business," said Lee, "we have heard that he collected about \$5000 in extortionate fees. We are informed that when some of them refused to give the fee he requested, he took what he could get. A fee of \$25 is required by the state."

PENDLETON HAS A
MURDER MYSTERY

[United Press Leased Wire.] Pendleton, Ore., June 7.—The authorities of this county have a murder mystery to solve in the finding of the corpse of a man jabbed into a box six inches too short.

The body was found yesterday near Cold Springs landing, on the Columbia river. The skull had been crushed in, and lime had been thrown over the remains. The victim was unusually tall, measuring 6 feet 5 inches. His identity has not been established.

CANADA OBJECTS TO
GUNBOATS ON LAKES

Ottawa, Can., June 7.—It is deemed probable that the Dominion government will address to the United States a formal protest against the presence in the Great Lakes of American war vessels. The recent passage through the Canadian waterways of the gunboat Nashville occasioned much criticism and adverse press comment. There are now eight United States warships in the lakes, and it is generally supposed that the United States government has overstepped the terms of the agreement in respect to the presence of warships on the waters of the lakes.

CHARGED WITH ARSON
SUSPECTED OF MURDER

Los Angeles, Cal., June 7.—A charge of arson, which may be supplemented by a more serious charge is pending today against Corwin Phelps, a Civil War veteran, who was taken from the Sawtelle soldiers' home to the county jail. The

charge is brought by Phelps' wife, who swears that a year ago her husband fired a shack at Sawtelle, in the ruins of which the body of Lawrence Hemmerlee, a veteran, was found afterwards. Hemmerlee had a belt containing \$1000, but after the fire only \$60 was found in it.

Hemmerlee rented the shack from the Phelps. The authorities made an investigation, and several arrests were made, but no clew to the supposed murder was found. Recently, however, strife developed between Phelps and his wife. It is alleged that Phelps retained a lawyer to secure a divorce, and when Mrs. Phelps heard of it she swore to the charge of arson. Phelps is being held in default of \$2000 bail.

JAP TRAINING SHIPS
VISIT PORTLAND

Portland, Or., June 7.—As guests of Portland and the Rose Festival Committee, Admiral Hikojiro Ijichi, commander of the Japanese naval training squadron, now in Puget Sound, and 13 officers of the Aso and Soya, are today being entertained royally by the city's prominent citizens.

The Japanese party arrived here from the north last evening, and was met at the depot by several hundred of Portland's Japanese residents and members of the Chamber of Commerce and the Rose Festival committee. The entertainment of the visitors started this morning with a trip to Council Crest, City Park and other interesting points about the city and vicinity.

AWAITS INVITATION
TO KILL HIMSELF

Pekin, June 7.—Yuan Shih Kai, one of the few colossal figures remaining after the era of Empress Tai an and her renowned councillor, Li Hung Chang, is reported today to be awaiting at Honan the grim "yellow cord," the imperial intimation that the recipient's death at his own hands would be most pleasing to the monarch.

Five officials, it is said, are bearing the symbol to the statesman and it is further reported that they are commissioned to watch him and allow Yuan two months to obey. At the end of that time Chinese justice will take its course and the bearers of the cord will accomplish their mission as effectively in the present as they have in the past.

Yuan Shih Kai, enemy of the present dowager empress, is believed to have "lost face" because of friendship for Tang Shao Yoi, who recently bore to America the imperial thanks for remission of the Boxer indemnity due from the United States. Yuan and Tang were friendly to Prince Ching, who is dangerously ill and was at present unable to protect his friends from their enemies at court.

BEATHILL COUNTY
FEUD IS REVIVED

Jackson, Ky., June 7.—Ed Callahan, former sheriff of Breathitt county and a notorious feudist, was shot and probably fatally wounded early today while opening his store.

The assassin was concealed in a coal bunker nearby and made his escape without revealing his identity.

Callahan, who is known as "Deacon Ed," has been actively connected with the Deaton feud which recently broke out afresh, and the shooting is supposed to have been a result of that fight. The ex-sheriff is wounded in the side and there is little chance of his recovery. He is a noted character in Breathitt county, having been a close associate of Judge James Hargis, who was shot and killed by his son, and his shooting has created a profound sensation. Further trouble is expected at once and in the event of his death there will probably be an opening battle between the contending factions.

THE BUSIEST DAY IN
PORTLAND'S HISTORY

Portland, Or., June 7.—Portland arose bright and early today to participate in two great events—the mayoralty election and the Rose Carnival, which promises to make this the busiest and most interesting day in the city's history, up to this time.

The election will engross the attention of the voters up to noon, when the battle of the votes will hold the center of the stage in favor of the beautiful roses, which seem to smother the city.

There are three mayoralty candidates in the field—Joseph Simon, Republican State Senator Albee, Independent, and Judge M. G. Munley, Democrat. Some pressure has been brought to bear to induce Albee to resign, so that Munley would have a clear track in his race against Simon but so far he has declined to step out. It is predicted that the total vote will be something like 24,000.

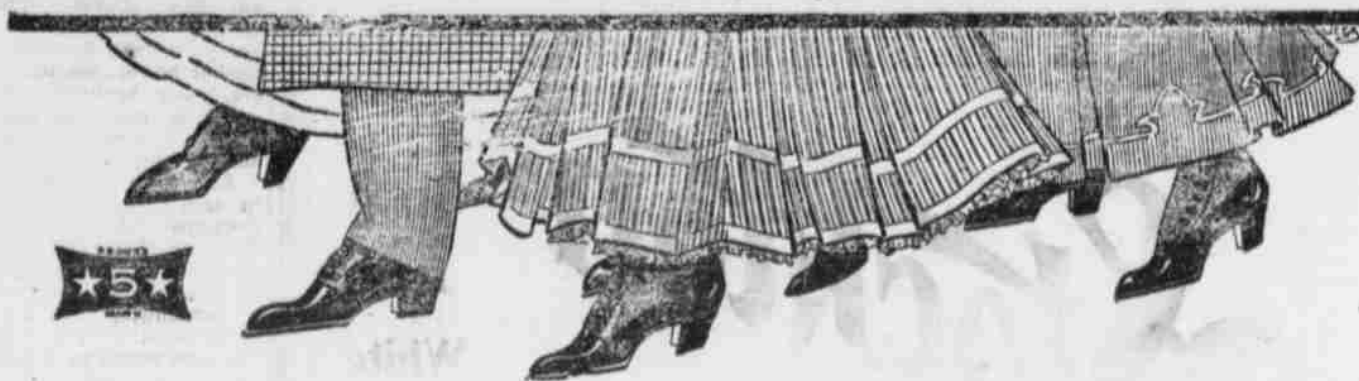
