WARM GAME SUNDAY SALEM INDEPENDENTS WALLOP THE MAROONS

After a slight misstep in the first inning yesterday afternoon the Salem Independents sailed into the Portland Maroon ball bunch like a whirlwind, and when the ninth inning showed up the score stood 8 to 1 in favor of Salem, with the score book showing 14 hits for Salem against two for Portland and two errors for the local side, while the Portland Maroons were credited with eight.

With the team Salem had on the field yesterday, the J. G. Mack Company, who were so stiff for the local team, would have been rubbed out of shape. Chester Bowen pitched fine ball throughout the contest, striking out ten men and walking but one. Fred Carey, Salem's first baseman, was out of the running again yesterday, and couldn't stop "sick 'em," although the big man got three hits

out of five times at bat. Salem fans sat up and took notice when two strange players trotted out on the lot. John Hunt, Woodburn's crack third baseman, stopped at second yesterday, and played his usual errorless game, while Smith a new arrival from the East, played short. Managers Heyser and Jerman have something great in this man Smith, owing to the fact that he has had experience, and can cover ground like a passenger train. Smith played an errorless game yesterday, getting four assists, two put outs and one hit. The little man backs up at nothing, whether it comes straight from the bat covered with smoke, or skimming up the dirt through short or pitcher. He has been engaged as a regular man for Salem, and will be a great help to the Salem Independents. John Humphreys played the third base, but John also played out of luck, being credited with an error and no hit. Managers Heyser and Jerman would not part with young Humphreys at any price, as he is a coming ball player, and a good man in the right place.

In the outfield Ott, "Racehorse" Johnson and Jerman scammed about. To get a ball away from these three gardeners, one must help it clear over the outfield fence, as all three of them are sprinters, sure catchers, and a bad sky don't affect their eyesight. A runaway occurred in the eighth inning, which caused considerable excitement. Johnson came to bat and drove one out into center field, which rolled a short distance beyond that player, and Johnson sailed about the sacks like a race horse, coming up at third before the ball was on its way back to the diamond. Perry Jones took the back stop job yesterday. Jones is a big,

husky fellow, and a splendid catcher. Out of three times at bat he got a run, a hit, and a stolen base, and had nine putouts.

About the only thing which can be said of the Portland Maroon team, is that they had a fairly good pitcher, who had a slow ball and speed galore, and a good, sure catcher. The balance of the team was composed of youngsters, apparently ranging from the ages of 17 to 18 years. Bowen had them all going from the very first of the game, and very seldom they ever got on base after the first inning.

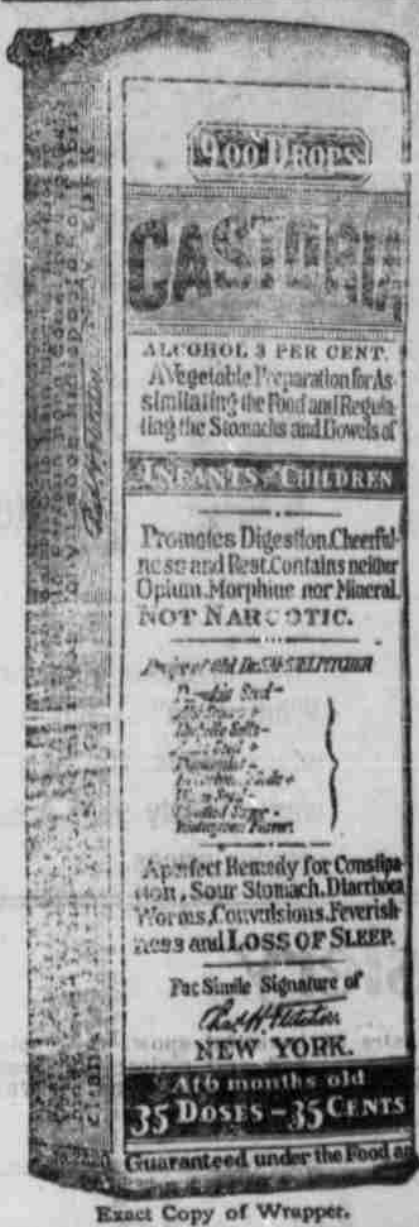
FOURTH VICTIM OF EXPLOSION DIES

 Oregon City, Or., June 7.—Pretty Villa Brown, the fourth victim of the dynamite explosion, which means Bert Garrett adopted to snuff out the lives of his family, at their home at Marquam Saturday morning, is dead.

After a day and a night of agony, the 16-year-old girl, who was Garrett's stepdaughter, succumbed to her injuries, yesterday morning. The funeral of Garrett took place yesterday forenoon and similar services were held last night over the remains of Mrs. Garrett and her two daughters. It was learned today that the 12 sticks of dynamite used by Garrett to commit the crime were purchased by him several days ago in Mount Angel, a nearby settlement.

Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of Court Street.

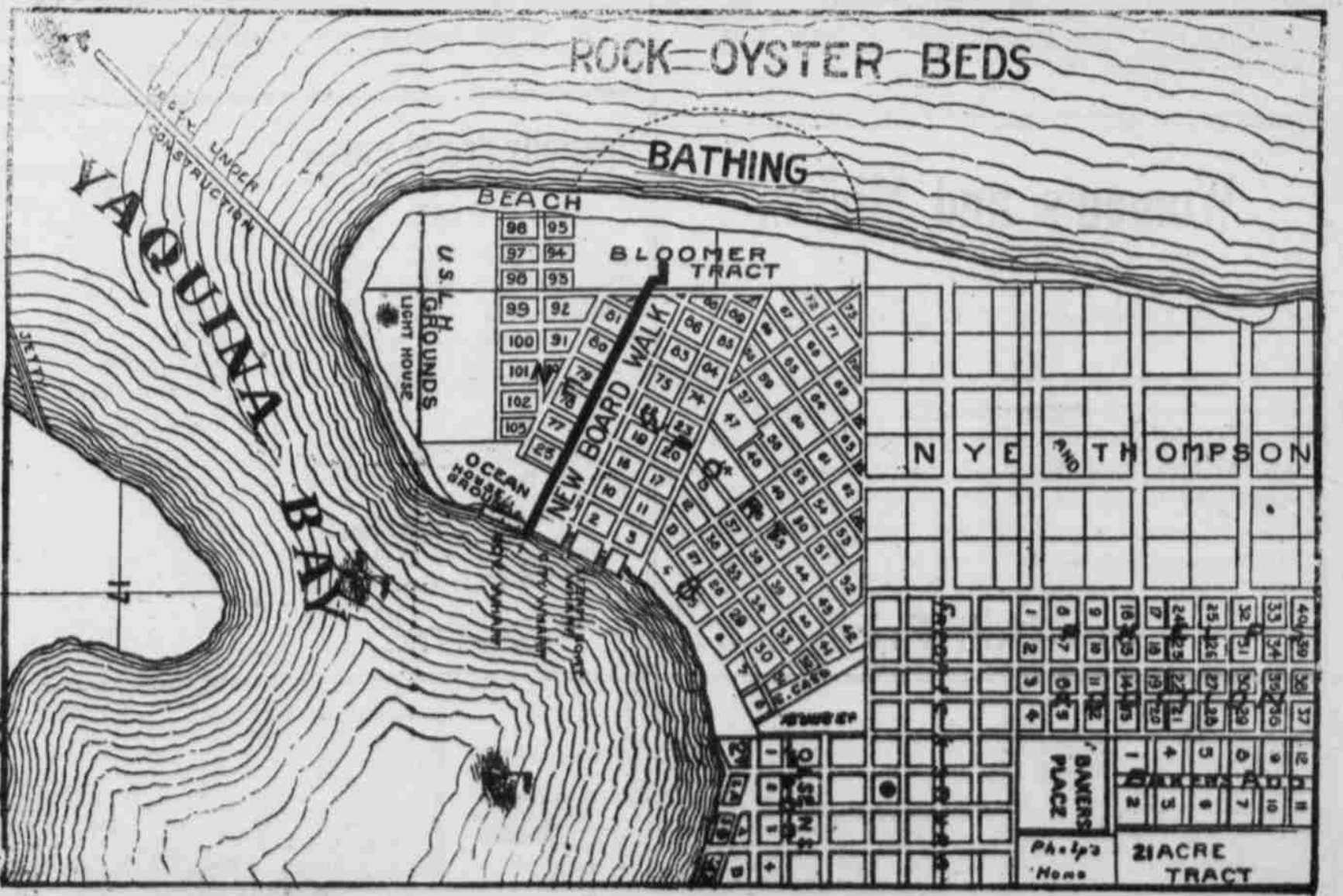
