Pioneer Preacher Dead—Rev. Campus Clark Sperry, one of Oregon's first Baptist ministers, died at his home in Brownsville Sunday at 5 p. m. of paralysis, following illness since May 26.

Rev. Sperry was born in Lawrence county, Ohio, October 8, 1850. He moved to Iowa in 1840 and there embraced the Baptist faith. He was married to Miss Rachel A. Fulton in Jefferson county, Mo., February 12, 1851, and on April 1, 1851, with his bride started by ox team for Oregon, arriving here the same year. He settled near Brownsville. He was licensed to preach in 1857, and from that time until his death worked continually for his church.
