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The Gatens Case—Judge William Galloway will not render a decision in the matter of the referendum petition of U'Ren and others questioning the validity of the emergency clause appointing Wm. Gatens additional judge in the fourth judicial district, until tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock. Although Judge Galloway has never given out any information regarding the conclusion he will probably arrive at, from the argument yesterday afternoon between the attorneys, it is the general opinion of those who have been following the case, that the decision will be in favor of the secretary of state.

About the White Plague—The State Board on Tuberculosis met at the state capital and transacted some important business in regard to the fight against the white plague in Oregon. The board selected the old mute school for the state sanatorium, and are looking over the building today to begin preparations as soon as possible of putting the place in order. Mayor Rodgers was elected as secretary of the board and Governor Benson as chairman. The board will hold another meeting late this afternoon.

Walters, an official of the Oregon Electric Railway Company in this city, has purchased several acres of land near Woodburn at \$125 an acre and he will be busy soon in planting it with fruit trees on the latest plan. Five of Mr. Walters' friends from the east have also bought land in the Woodburn district and intend to raise fruit. This is a valuable piece of property Mr. Walters and his friends have purchased, as the Oregon Electric has issued orders for a branch line to be built from West Woodburn to Woodburn, which will run within a short distance of the property.

HORSE BREAKS RECORD FOR HIGH JUMPING

London, June 9.—Establishing a new world's record for high jumping horses and winning a \$2500 gold cup owned by King Edward, Jubilee, ridden by Captain Berlie, of France, cleared the bar at 7 feet, 4 inches at the international horse show today. The king sent hearty congratulations to the captain, despite the fact that it was well-known that the monarch was particularly anxious to see an Englishman win the trophy. Jumping at this year's horse show is on a scale never before attempted in any show ring. England has been so badly outclassed in such contests in recent years that the war office was stirred into action, and insisted that the training of this class of horsemanship should be improved at once. It is known that the king had had much to do with the stirring up of the department, and it was for the purpose of encouraging his subjects to take an interest in what they have heretofore considered "circus riding" that he offered the valuable trophy for today's event. As the result the Englishmen made a much better showing than ever before, but were unable to outclass the expert Frenchman. More than \$100,000 in prizes have been offered for this show and the finest horses in the world are participating. Much interest is evinced in the coaching Marathon, which is scheduled for June 14. The first prize in this event will be a \$500 cup offered by Joseph Winder, of Philadelphia.
