

SAYS PACIFIC MAIL
IS LOSING MONEY

San Francisco, June 11.—Arraigning himself and his company as "suckers," R. P. Scherwin, general manager of the Pacific Mail Steamship lines, announced today that chiefs of his service would confer with officials of the Panama railroad August 1, and that a report to Secretary Dickinson of the war department might result in a continuance of the Panama service of the Harman corporation. The Pacific Mail recently decided to abandon its service in connection with the government's Isthmian railroad, declaring that, under the present division of receipts, no money could be made on the contract.

"Secretary Dickinson must decide whether or not we continue our Panama service," declared Scherwin, who has just returned from New York and Washington. "If the terms of the agreement are not altered, we will have to abandon it, and the government will either be compelled to charter its own ships, or find some other sucker to handle the business. I use 'sucker' advisedly, for that is what anyone would be who would try it."

The steamship manager said that his company had intended to abandon the service August 12, but that they had given the government 60 days longer in which to adjust the matter. "I did not want to embarrass the government," said Scherwin magnanimously.

The people of San Francisco came in for several hard raps from the officials. He was very bitter because he said the newspapers appeared to be anxious to have the Pacific Mail abandon the Panama service, and scornfully exclaimed:

"Helpful San Francisco!"

SUES FOR AN INCH
STRIP OF CITY LAND

San Francisco, June 11.—Suit for the smallest parcel of land ever in litigation in the local courts, and probably ever involved in a legal battle, is pending here today. The tract is an inch and three-quarters wide at its broadest place, which is on Market street, and tapers to a point at Geary.

Katherine A. Rivers and Marie Munro are plaintiffs in the suit, which is brought against the Mutual Savings Bank, whose building projects over the diminutive tract. Should the case be decided in favor of the plaintiffs, the bank will probably be compelled to purchase the property.

The body was found in a large bundle, which was being guarded by a boy, who did not know its contents. The police think the murderers hired the boy to guard the gruesome package, so that it would not be interfered with while the secured a wagon to haul it away and dump it into the harbor.

Identification was made by means of a laundry mark on the clothing.

CARGO OF DYNAMITE
ANNIHILATES SHIP

Algiers, June 11.—The crew of the German steamer Ava has arrived here on the steamer Eastgate, having been picked up off Pantellaria island yesterday, following their escape from the Ava, which was ground to pieces by a dynamite explosion.

Fire broke out at night on the German steamer, which was bound from Hamburg to Vladivostok, and as dynamite formed the greater part of the cargo, the crew made haste to launch the lifeboats and pull away from the vessel before the fire had time to reach the shell. They were none too soon, for within 15 minutes after it had been abandoned, a terrific explosion took place, which literally tore the ship to pieces, and left the water covered with wreckage.

SAYS LEGISLATORS
ARE DEGENERATES

Oakland, Cal., June 11.—Mrs. Lillian Coffin, prominent suffragette worker, of San Francisco, has caused a sensation in suffragette circles about San Francisco by branding the solons of the state legislature "degenerates." In a speech before the members of the Amendment League Mrs. Coffin told the women that the fate of the measures they had endeavored to have passed by the recent legislature was deserved, and urged the women of the league to exercise their influence for the election of efficient and trustworthy legislators.

"If the women secure anything at the hands of the legislature, it is merely a personal favor. It requires courage to go before a body of degenerates to plead a cause. If you want what justice demands from the legislature, you must have some hold on the men sent to it. There were splendid men in the state senate, but they were in the minority."

Mrs. Coffin's statements were applauded enthusiastically by the delegates to the meeting.

Judge Henry McGinn Married.
Judge Henry E. McGinn and Mrs. Louise Summers were married quietly at Portland, late yesterday afternoon by Judge Bronough. The ceremony was performed in the latter's chambers at the court house. TOOK STRANGE METHOD
OF PASSING OVER

Dallas, Or., June 11.—E. Kimball, a farmer, living about three miles from Dallas, committed suicide Wednesday night by shooting himself. His wife was absent at the time, and there is every indication that the suicide was planned deliberately. The gun by which the deed was committed was chained in a tree and a string attached by means of a pulley to the trigger, so that Kimball could discharge the gun while standing in front of its muzzle. He received the charge in the throat, death being almost instantaneous.

The deceased was a pioneer of 1852 and a veteran of the Indian War of 1856. He came to Oregon from Ohio. A wife and three grown

children survive him. His suicide is attributed to melancholy, resulting from ill health and financial troubles.
