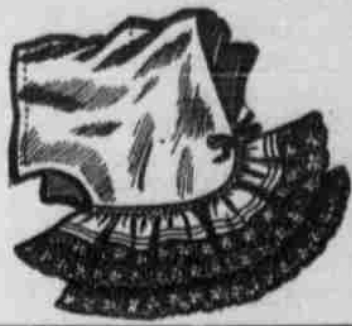

CHERRY FAIR WILL BE HELD A WEEK EARLIER

All Committee Work Well in Hand--Place and Date Chosen.
Big Eugene Excursion Planned.

The general committee of the cherry fair met at the Board of Trade rooms Friday evening and went over all the important features of that great annual carnival. The place selected for holding the cherry fair is the large Eckert building, opposite Ye Liberty theatre. It will hold an exhibit twice as large as last year and is susceptible of beautiful decorations. The stage is to be erected on the opposite side of the street between two brick buildings, where all the outdoor musical programs will be rendered.

Great Street Shows. The committee on exhibits also recommended that all show windows of the city be decorated for the occasion, and that booths be erected over the sidewalks with entertaining and amusing features for the public. It is very apparent from the reports of the committees that there will be a bigger cherry show than ever before. More cherries will be shown in competition from all the valley counties than have ever been seen before. It will be a far more complete cherry exhibit than was shown last year, and that surprised everybody.

The financial committee reported

\$1600 listed and more to come in. The executive committee was authorized to prepare a budget of expenditures and submit the same not later than next Tuesday evening. Col. E. Hofer made a strong plea for large appropriations on three lines: publicity, sports and exhibits. He said that if the largest expenditures were made for these three purposes the fair would be a grand success. He advocated sending a special train with 1000 to 1500 people to the celebration at Eugene on July 5, the train to be decorated and all to boost for the cherry fair. The committee on sports and amusements made an informal report, advocating one feature that is to be very beautiful, consisting of flower dances by the children to be executed every evening on the electric lighted streets.

The days finally set for the cherry fair are July 8, 9, 10, as reports from large fruit growers present showed that the fruit was ripening so fast that the fair would have to be held one week earlier than was formerly decided upon. The final estimates for expenditures will be made on next Tuesday afternoon.

SUNDAY PROGRAM AT BAPTIST TABERNACLE

Without brass-band methods, with simple, earnest singing, praying and preaching the word, Dr. McInturf and Rev. John M. Comer have started the biggest and most effective evangelization movement in the Capital City of Oregon that has been known here since the great revival at the Methodist church about 15 years ago. At that time over 800 professed conversion, and all the churches were filled up with members.

There is a big Sunday program at the First Baptist church. At 11 a. m. Dr. McInturf will preach on "Christ and Childhood," and at 8 p. m. he will give the greatest sermon on "Experimental Religion" in his whole series, entitled "My Conversion and How I Was Whipped for Preaching the Gospel." Standing room will be at a great premium in the Baptist Tabernacle Sunday night.

There was a child's meeting at 3 p. m. this afternoon, which was attended by hundreds of little ones, and at which both Mr. and Mrs. McInturf spoke on themes interesting to the children.

There will be the usual street meeting at 7:15 this evening, and preaching at the church at 8 p. m. by Dr. McInturf. His sermon last night was on the "Power of the Holy Ghost." He said the church would bring more men to God if the members were right in their daily lives. Even some of the ministers needed conversion by the power of the Holy Ghost. He prayed with a minister

once until he felt that power, and lay on the floor and prayed until 3 o'clock in the morning. It was the only power that could take sin out of the church. The first need was to have religion in your own home. That was the Jerusalem. Next was to carry it over the fence to your neighbor. That was taking it into Samaria. If a man needs help, get in and help him. Help him with prayers, help him with your pocket-book. But do something, if you want to save a man. Dr. McInturf's wonderful power over the hearts and feelings of his audience can only be understood by attending his meetings.
