The revival meetings at the Baptist tabernacle conducted by Dr. McInturff and Rev. John Comer are awakening the people of Salem to the necessity of more hearty and energetic church work. The audiences are growing at every meeting, until the big church is filled to standing room.

Sunday night Dr. McInturff preached a powerful sermon, taking as his text John 19:4, "I find no fault in him." From this he drew a vivid picture of the Nazarene, showing that he was indeed without fault. He went over the life of Jesus showing that none sought him in vain, and that his life was one of gentleness,

of kindness, of love for all mankind. He always helped, and he never hurt. And in presenting this picture of the Savior he at times drew a comparison as to the work of Jesus and the work of preachers and the churches today and exhorted them to wake up and do the Master's work. It was a sermon such as is seldom heard in Salem, or for that matter, anywhere, and the hearty amens that followed his fervid utterances, attested their force and convincingness.

mistaken for Henry Ward Beecher; his voice is slightly harsh, probably from much speaking, but is strong and his enunciation clear. Every word he utters can be heard, and his command of language is excellent. When warmed up to his subject he speaks rapidly and moves from one end of the platform to the other with a lithe leonine movement, expressive of power.

His illustrations are apt and his speech epigrammatic. Here are a few of his crisp sentences:

"Every time a church member sins, the church and its members must bear the ignominy."

"A diamond is valueless if filled with flaws, and a Christian is no good when he lives in sin."

"I have never preached beyond my experience nor beyond my faith, and I never will."

"Pilate had no backbone; he said of Christ, 'I find no fault in him,' and then said to the Jews 'take him and crucify him if you will.'"

"The judge said he is innocent, take him out and kill him."

He was impartial in his criticisms, too, as a few samples will show:

"The saloons are not fighting the churches; they don't think we are worth it."

"The Epworth leagues and dozens

of other such societies are what is hurting the church by their lack of enthusiasm and the fear of hurting somebody's feelings."

"You must vote as you pray. Why, on election day the church vote and the saloon vote huddle together in the ballot box and just love one another."

"Christians that go to the theater, dances and card parties are an injury to the church."

"Women see some old bell wether giving a card party and they say 'Oh, my, I must go,' and they follow the old bell wether instead of the Savior."

Our flag is all right, let's get under it. Our church is all right, let's get up to it! God is all right, let's get the church closer to Him!

Ingersoll was in some respects a great preacher, for he hated and fought hypocrites. "I don't like the church in plug hats and high collars and on dress parade. I like it in the heat and sweat of battle for the salvation of souls."

"When once you get into hell and the lid is on, all the popes and priests that ever lived could pray on their knees and pray forever without getting you out. Once in hell you are there to stay."

Indeed his whole sermon was of the epigrammatic class.

No one who hears him can doubt his honesty or his sincerity.

Following his sermon he gave the story of his conversion; the story of his life. Of his struggle for an education, and how upon his conversion some enthusiastic brother, shouting over him, used his back for a pulpit and pounded him black and blue; of the manner in which he converted both his grandfather and father; of his later services for the Methodist church; of his separation therefrom, and his taking up evangelistic work, where he could preach the word of God without being hampered or dictated to by man.

The services will continue for the week and those who fail to hear Dr. McInturff will surely have something to regret.

There were seven conversions at the street meeting Saturday night, the convert kneeling on the sidewalk and confessing the Savior during the meeting. There were 19 conversions from Saturday noon up to the meeting last night and 174 in all. Dr. McInturff preached to children yesterday, and there were seven conversions.
