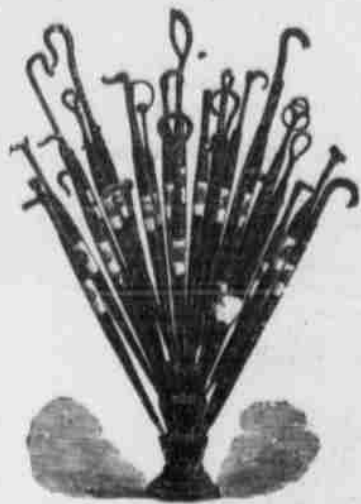

LION KILLS MEMBER OF THE ROOSEVELT PARTY

(By Warrington Dawson, Staff Correspondent of the United Press)
Nalvaba, British East Africa, June 15.—H. Williams, a member of Colonel Roosevelt's hunting party, was attacked and fatally injured by a lion last Saturday, according to news brought here today by a runner from the American ex-President's camp. The runner failed to say whether or not Colonel Roosevelt witnessed the tragedy.

Williams, an English resident of the Lumbwa district, is an experienced hunter. He was hunting with F. C. Selous and W. N. McMillan Saturday when attacked by the lion. He shot and wounded the great beast, but was unable to escape from its path when it sprang toward him.

Selous and McMillan were not within range at the time, but rushed to the scene and killed the lion before it had time to tear the unfortunate Englishman to pieces.

The party had hunted but little before the runner left camp and he was unable to say what luck was attending Colonel Roosevelt.

COUNCIL PUSHES LARGE NUMBER OF IMPROVEMENTS

A number of street improvements were advanced at the meeting of the city council Monday night. A grade was ordered on Liberty street, north of Union. Mr. Stolz reported the perpetual contract with the Minto Bros. by which the city will secure a practically unlimited gravel supply at 5 cents per cubic yard. Street Commissioner Pooler reported the barge about ready to convey team with gravel back and forth to the island, and before the week is over Chairman Stolz expects to be placing gravel upon the Fair grounds road. The improvement of North Winter street was ordered paid for.

Plans and specifications for the improvement of Miller street, from High to Rock, were adopted. Estimated cost, \$1,235. This street is to be graded 32 feet wide with a roadway of rolled gravel 16 feet wide.

The ordinance levying assessments for widening of Chemeketa street between 14th and 15th was passed. Bids were opened for pavement of Hazel avenue between Highland and Locust streets and awarded to the North Salem Improvement League at \$593.93. This is \$138 for excavation, \$39.80 for fill, \$401.10 for gravel and \$15 for culverts.

Enos Prossell gave notice that he would make his own improvements.

The city engineer was ordered to hasten the work on the street improvements in the seventh ward.

A. Bush remonstrated against building pavement on Court street, between Commercial and Front.

REMOVE BAN FROM RESTAURANT BUSINESS

The ordinance granting restaurants and hotels adjoining a saloon the right to serve beer and wine with meals was given another airing last night. It is not the vicious booze measure which some persist in calling it, but is believed by members of the council who are apparently upright and moral citizens, and have never disgraced themselves or their families, to be in the interest of good order and common decency. They argue that under this ordinance two or three places serve beer to perhaps one customer out of twenty. If this ordinance is not enacted some large places like the Louvre, the Hofbrau, or Blazers, will be opened which will pay the restaurant and beer license and hundreds will be sitting at tables, drinking beer and listening to the seductive strains of an orchestra, as they by the thousands do in Portland. The present condition is encouraging the bottle business, where people buy bottled goods and pack them into restaurant to drink with their meals. It is argued that it is in the interest of morality to allow two or three places to serve liquors with meals to those who want them, in place of encouraging the larger establishments. A large tourist travel is avoiding Salem because a ban has been placed upon their custom of having beer or wine with their meals. The ordinance was sent to the city attorney for some minor amendments, as it now conflicts with other ordinance regulating such places.

SUPREME COURT HANDS DOWN THREE OPINIONS

Three opinions were handed down by the supreme court this morning as follows: T. K. Anderson and J. K. Anderson, as administrators of the estate of N. A. Williamson, deceased, vs. Grant Phigier and Emma G. Robinson, defendants and appellants, appealed from the circuit court of Josephine county, H. K. Harris, judge, order of confirmation was set aside and the cause remanded; opinion by Justice McBride.

J. M. Rodgers, respondent, vs. The Portland Lumber Company, appellant; appealed from the circuit court of Multnomah county, Thos. O'Day, judge; affirmed; opinion by Justice Lakin.

This is a case where the respondent, Rogers, was given judgment in the lower court in the sum of \$5000 as damages for losing an arm in the lumber company's mills as the result of becoming caught in a moving chain. The lumber company appealed the case on the grounds that Rogers failed to use necessary precaution and was guilty of contributory negligence. The evidence showed, however, according to the opinion of the supreme court, that the chain over which Rogers was working at the time, was operated automatically and that it was not the fault of the workmen that the machinery started after it had been stopped by a certain lever throwing the gears out of motion.

Stanley Oldland, respondent, vs. The Oregon Coal and Navigation Company, appellants; appealed from the circuit court of Coos county, J. W. Hamilton, judge; motion to strike out bill of exceptions denied; opinion by Chief Justice Moore.

MINOR MATTERS IN THE SALEM COUNCIL

The building ordinance has been made a special order for Monday, June 21.

Mr. Stockton reported that in one saloon there had been a fight during the past week and moved that in the event of any such disturbances being reported that the offender's license be revoked. Mr. Prossell seconded the resolution.

Mr. Stockton reported progress in the matter of securing a dumping ground for city refuse. The Capital Improvement Company had a vacant place across the river which could be secured.

City Attorney Walter E. Keyes reported adversely on the claim of Mr. Goodenough for injuries sustained in defective sidewalk on Asylum avenue. Street Commissioner Pooler reported dangerous condition of bridge on Mission street at Yew Park school. He recommended that it be built full width of the street and that the Southern Pacific company be notified. Agent Houston has wired his company and the bridge has been closed.

On report of Chairman Walt Low the city will purchase 500 feet of hose from the A. G. Long company of Portland at 90 cents per foot.

There were nine aldermen present Monday night—Elliot, Greenbaum, Hofer, Low, Sauter, Stockton, Stolz and Waters. Absent, Moores, Millard, Hill, Moffett and Eldridge.

POLLTAX COLLECTION GIVEN AN AIRING

Polltax matters were given an airing Monday night in the city council. The names of about 40 delinquents, including a member of the city council and one of the fire department, was ordered to collection by the city attorney. These names were turned in by Polltax Collector Robert Halley. He has been collecting polltax on a 10 per cent commission, which the mayor ruled was illegal, and hereafter all such taxes will be turned in and a bill will have to be audited for the collector. Mr. Hofer developed the fact that the lists of registered voters are taken as the basis of polltax collection which accounts for so many not registering and voted no on the motion to enforce collection.

SKULL BROKEN BY FALL

LITTLE THREE-YEAR-OLD BOY BADLY HURT

While playing on the balcony leading across the front of the Blue Front lodging house yesterday afternoon, the little three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Ardell lost his balance and plunged head first over the railing to the pavement, nearly 25 feet below.

The unfortunate little tot was seen to fall by Mr. Fletcher, who conducts a feed store directly across the street from the Blue Front, and he ran across the street and picked the boy up, carrying him to the D. J. Fry drug store, where Doctors Clay and Bean attended his injuries, after which he was removed to the Willamette Sanitarium, where he is now resting as easily as could be expected, and the physicians are of the opinion he will survive in spite of a fractured skull and a terrible bruising.

Last night the boy regained consciousness and asked for a drink of water and this morning he appears to be getting along nicely.

The balcony off from which the child fell is surrounded with a substantial railing four feet high, but the little fellow, not realizing his danger, climbed up on top of the railing and lost his balance. Children often play on the balcony, and this is the first accident ever occurring there. Mrs. Ardell had left the children but a short time when the accident occurred, and is prostrated with grief over the sad affair.
