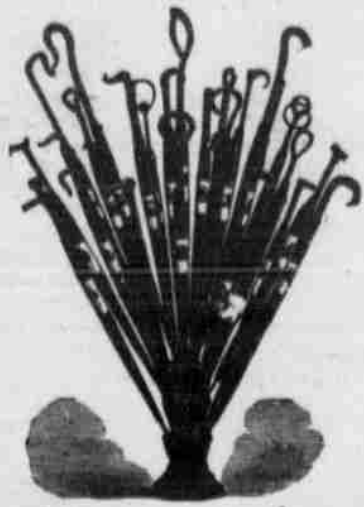

THE DEAD INDIAN WINKED AND THEN GRINNED AT THE CORONER

Ukiah, Cal., June 16.—Opening his eyes, and then indulging in a prodigiously solemn wink, Richard Williams, an Indian, who Saturday shot his wife and then turned the gun on himself, to avoid arrest, created consternation in a local undertaking parlor, where the inquest over his body was to have been held, late yesterday.

Stretched on a bier and accompanied by a band of waiting Indians, Williams' body was brought to Ukiah five hours later, while the coroner was examining the body, the redskin opened his eyes, blinked and grinned. The coroner and the undertaker retreated in alarm.

Williams was taken to the county hospital where he was treated for a severe wound in his neck. It is thought he will recover.

USED STRONG DRINK AND ALSO STRONG LANGUAGE

[United Press Leased Wire.]

New York, June 16.—Tales of liquor drinking and intoxication again occupied the sessions of the Mrs. Howard Gould separate maintenance suit today.

Harry Turner, an employee of Castle Gould since 1906, swore that he saw Mrs. Gould under the influence of liquor in the latter part of July or early in August, 1906, and again in the same condition November 6, 1906. On cross examination he stated that these were the only two occasions on which he had ever seen Mrs. Gould when she appeared to be intoxicated.

Turner testified that he had never seen Mrs. Gould take a drink but that he overheard her tell Manager Malloy of Castle Gould that he was discharged and "call him some names."

On cross examination he admitted that Mrs. Gould had complained because she was not treated as she should be by her servants.

William Wyson, who was employed at Castle Gould in 1903, testified that Katherine was apparently intoxicated at one time when he saw her and that she called William Murphy, another employee, a bad name.

Augustus Wright, a clerk employed by Malloy, swore that he saw Mrs. Gould intoxicated but said he never saw her take a drink.

Reinhard Carlson, who from October, 1904, to August, 1905, was head

coachman at Castle Gould, related three specific instances when he alleged his mistress was intoxicated.

Carlson said that at one time Mrs. Gould drove into a fence while trying to get through a gate. Another time, he said, he saw her intoxicated on the piazza of the hotel at Larchmont.

The third occasion was when she accused a harness cleaner of intoxication, when the fact was, the head coachman declared, that Mrs. Gould was under the influence of liquor and the stableman was sober.

Carlson told of another incident when he was driving Katherine to a train she wanted to catch. "You gallop those horses," he quoted her as saying, "I don't give a damn if you kill them. If you don't catch that train I'll discharge everyone in the stable."

She missed the train and Carlson discharged the stablemen but they refused to leave because part of their wages remained unpaid. Later she discharged Carlson because he had not paid the men.
