Uncle Sam's Sawmill—
A dispatch in today's Journal says the United States cut 32,289,369,000 feet of lumber in 1908. A reporter, with an idle moment, put these figures into tangible shape, so that the mind could grasp them. This amount would cover a walk 254 feet wide around the earth at the equator; it would make a solid pile of lumber more than four feet high and five feet around the earth. It would mean that the mills of the country cut every day a board one foot wide that would reach two-thirds of the way around this old world of ours, and this would make a sidewalk six feet wide from New York to San Francisco. Oath of Abstinence.
State of Oregon, County of Marion: We, the undersigned, Frederic C. Geer and O. R. Blakesley, do solemnly swear in the presence of Almighty God that from and after this date, the 2d day of June, A. D., 1866, we will not use in any manner or form the plant commonly called tobacco, and we further swear that from and after the date aforesaid we will not use as a beverage any spirituous or malt liquors, so help us God.
