MAILED HAND FELL HEAVILY ON AFRICA

[United Press Leased Wire.]

London, June 18.—A terrible picture of the native rebellion in German East Africa, which broke out in July, 1905, and lasted through 1906, is given in a consular report for that region just issued.

The mortality on the native side was appalling. The total death roll among the natives cannot have fallen short of 120,000 men, women and children, and may have amounted to more. In addition to this, many

of the natives, in fear of retaliatory measures, fled across the border.

The mortality on the German side amounted to only 11 Europeans and 80 native soldiers.

The war brought famine and pestilence in its train. The neglected soil yielded no crops; the famished natives fell an easy prey to disease, and in many districts a terrible mortality among the children endured.

The rising which led to the war was an anti-European movement, which was attributed to the severity of the German administration.

The Salem fans are with the Fairmount club hook, line, sinker and a few joints of pole, and next Sunday a large and enthusiastic crowd is expected to be present to root for the home team.

NEGRO IS CAPTURED AND JAILED AT THE DALLIES

The Dallis, Or., June 18.—R. E. Brooks, the colored Pullman porter, accused of shooting Bernard H. Trumbull and John McLaughlin, representatives of the Illinois Central, at Shaniko, Ore., early last Wednesday morning, admitted today that he did the shooting, but insisted that he used his revolver in self-defense.

Brooks was captured yesterday afternoon by a posse headed by Sheriff Levi Christman on a road 22 miles from The Dallis. The colored man made no resistance, as his strength was nearly all gone. All he had eaten since the shooting were a few crackers. Brooks tells a different story from the one related by Trumbull and McLaughlin. He says the two men had been abusing him; that when they tried to push him from the wood buyers' special train he got his revolver, but did not shoot until Trumbull was on top of him twisting his arm.

DROPPED DEAD WHILE PLAYING TENNIS

Vancouver, Wash., June 18.—While playing tennis last yesterday

afternoon O. H. Stewart, 50 years old, and a clerk in the headquarters of the Department of the Columbia, dropped dead in the presence of a crowd that had gathered to watch the game.

Dr. R. D. Wiswall, who was on the grounds, quickly applied restoratives, but the stricken man did not regain consciousness. It is thought that the bursting of a blood vessel near the heart caused death. It is said that Stewart had been suffering from arterial sclerosis for some time or 20 years he had been connected with the government in either a civil or military capacity.

SWIPED CLOTHES AND THEN HE SKIPPED

San Francisco, June 18.—Assaulting two of his fellow prisoners and stealing several suits of clothes, Edward Byers, a county prisoner, escaped today from the city and county hospital a few days ago, it was learned today.

Byers was serving a term for petty larceny when he was sent to the hospital June 3. His addiction to the use of morphine caused his removal from the jail, and his condition was regarded as such that no guard was considered necessary. He recovered Sunday, overpowered two fellow patients and ran away. His escape was not made public until today.
