GREAT AUTO RACES

Strang, driving the Buick entered as No. 1,4 was forced to quit on the second lap, when the rear axle of his car split. Both driver and mechanic got a hard fall, but escaped with minor bruises.

The first lap was covered by Burman, in Buick No. 2, in 23:41, according to the announcement of the official time keeper. On the Lowell straightaway, Burman's car made 71 miles an hour.

Knipper, in car No. 5, a Chalmers-Detroit, took the lead away from Burman in the third lap and Chevrolet, in Buick No. 8, bumped into second place, Burman dropping into third.

Knipper's lead was small and the three cars raced at the rate of 70 miles an hour, clinging within 100 yards of each other.

Crown Point, Ind., June 18.—J. Matson, driving a Chalmers-Detroit, won the Indiana cup race over the Crown Point-Lowell course today, in four hours 31 minutes and 21 seconds. The race was ten laps, making a total distance of 236 miles.

George Robertson, who won the last Vanderbilt cup race, was second in a Locomobile, his time being four hours 39 minutes and three seconds.

A. Mosen in a Marlon was third. Mosen covered the course in four hours 42 minutes and three seconds.

The finish of the race was spectacular. As the three leading cars entered the final lap every person in the grandstand was upon his feet cheering wildly. The cars driven by Robertson and Matson were so close together as they passed the stand that a blanket would almost have covered both drivers.

The fifth lap brought another shapen to the relative positions of the cars. Matson in the Chalmers-Detroit, No. 19, shot into the lead at the finish of the lap, which marked the half-way point in the race. At that point Matson's total elapsed time was two hours 19 minutes and 19 seconds.

Mosen, driving a Marlon, No. 6, was a close second at the half-way point. Robertson in the Locomobile, No. 10, was third and Poole in Chalmers-Detroit, No. 17, was fourth.

During the sixth lap Buick, No. 2, driven by Burman came up to the stand bearing Strang who was put out of the race by a broken axle. Burman had deliberately disqualified himself by borrowing an oil cup. This left the Buick without a representative in the race.

The Marlon, No. 3, driven by H. E. Stutz, blew off a cylinder head and went into a ditch. No one was injured but Stutz was compelled to drop out of the race.

At the end of the eighth lap the Chalmers-Detroit, driven by Matson, remained in the lead; Mosen in the Marlon was second, and Robertson in the Locomobile third. At the end of the ninth lap Matson's elapsed time was 4:04:22; Mosen 4:11:44, and Robertson 4:12:22 1-5.

Vagrancy Cases Dismissed—The case against Emma Thomas, charged with vagrancy, brought before Recorder Moores was dismissed yesterday afternoon. It seems there is no ordinance prohibiting the conducting of bawdy houses in Salem nor any clause regulating them, hence the ordinance making any one who frequented such houses a vagrant was of no force.

Not Used to Bitulithic—While driving around the corner near the Grand opera house building this morning a young horse belonging to Lute Dennis of Rickreall slipped on the pavement and fell flat. The owner, assisted by several bystanders, got the animal on its feet again shortly and outside of a few scratches from the hard surface the horse was uninjured. Neither the harness nor rig was damaged by the accident.

For Weighing Lumber—The railroad commission has notified the Northern Pacific Railroad Company and the Astoria and Columbia River Railroad Company that a hearing is to be held soon regarding the facilities along their lines for the weighing of lumber. This matter has been taken up heretofore by the commission with the Southern Pacific and other lines in Oregon, and they are now endeavoring to extend the hearings to all roads of importance.

'Bubbled up From Below'—A. D. Falkon and family of Pasadena passed through the city today in their monster touring car en route for Seattle to attend the exposition. Mr. Falkon describes his trip so far as being more beautiful than he expected and his praise of the Willamette valley is great and enthusiastic. With his family he will visit the Seattle fair for a few weeks, after which they will start on their return home to Pasadena and stop off in Salem for a day or two to visit the different state institutions.
