DIPLOMAS AND DEGREES REWARD STUDENTS' WORK COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS OF WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY GRADUATES LARGE CLASS

The graduating exercises of the College of Liberal Arts of Willamette university were held at the Methodist church Thursday evening, June 17. It was advertised for 8 o'clock and by that hour the big church was well filled, but as another half hour dragged away the inevitable late ones kept crowding in until the aisles were filled with chairs, and these in turn were filled with Salemites who have but little regard for time. From 7:30 to 8 there were converging streams of friends of the college or of the graduates, all flowing towards the church, and all apparently flower-laden. The results were shown in the church, where roses and carnations, flowers of all kinds and colors, gave their brightness to altar and chancel, and filled the air with fragrance. After the invocation by Rev. J. W. McDougal of Portland, Mrs. W. Carlton Smith, Salem's favorite, sang "My Dear" so beautifully that the vast audience would not be pacified until she answered an encore. This was followed by an address by Judge Stephen A. Lowell, who talked fluently and forcibly. The crux of his address was the necessity of having a definite aim in life, some line of action to follow, some object to attain. Not only must there be an object, an aim, but once this is selected there must be persistency. These must be no wavering, no changing paths, no turning back, until the goal was reached. This would require courage, for no path, however well it may be blazed by those who have gone before, is free from obstacles. He pointed out examples of those whose names were on the roll of fame and showed that each had one object, one aim, and stuck to it. Alexander the Great, Napoleon, Livingston, Wendell Phillips, Edison, each and all, and all others who had achieved greatness were men who devoted their lives to a fixed purpose. He pointed the way for the class in which alone lies worthy results, and while warning its members of the many difficulties they would meet, insisted that along the line of earnest, conscientious Christian endeavor could

worthy success be reached. His address was forcible and logical and his delivery fluent and pleasing. He was heartily applauded. The organ solo by Frederick S. Mendenhall was so well appreciated that Mr. Mendenhall was compelled to answer to an encore, after which the class took position in front of the altar, and after a few brief but heartfelt words to the young friends he was about to bid goodbye, he gave to each the well-earned diploma, at the same time conferring the degrees as follows:

 Besides these, Dr. Homan conferred the degree of Bachelor of Arts on Miss Lila Swafford and the degree of Doctor of Divinity upon James W. Madden and Rev. George F. Durgin, and upon Judge Robert Eakin the degree of L. L. D.
 A masterly violin solo by Le Roy Gesner was followed by the benediction, and then there were congratulations and flowers and smiles and good wishes as pure and sweet as the blossoms that typified them.
 It was the second class in point of numbers ever graduated from Willamette, and is one of which that institution may well feel proud. With the graduating exercises Willamette rounded out a full 65 years.
