BOOSTS FOR SEATTLE AND THE BIG A.Y.P.-- SAYS IT WAS SPLENDID

Salem Man Returns From Visit to Fair Highly Pleased—He
Says Oregon Building Is Fine and State
Well Represented.

Mr. D. F. Wagner has just return-
ed from a flying trip to the great
exposition at Seattle and having seen
the sights told a Capital Journal re-
porter that in every sense of the
word it is a great and immense at-
fair.

"A visit to the Oregon state build-
ing was much enjoyed. This is one
of the finest buildings on the ground
and Oregon has cause to be proud of
it. It and the grand government
building are the only two with large
domes, the Oregon dome represents
a large grain farm in natural grain,
very unique. Mr. Taylor is doing
good work for Oregon, especially for
Marion county, and in my opinion is
the right man for the right place.
He has sent many toward our city
and county. As to prunes and ap-
ples, we have the world beat, our
only competition being California,
and they remarked and acknowledged
to Mr. Taylor that we had them
skinned on the prune question.

"Miss Maggie Cosper is also doing
good work in her department. Mr.
Taylor says we are and will be ben-
efited more than by the Lewis and
Clark fair, as thousands of western
farmers are coming west and more
will, and they are not hunting the
fine arts building.

"The California building is grand

In its display. The government build-
ing is also grand and would take a
week to see all in it alone. The
crowds expected have not as yet ma-
terialized but they will. This much
for Seattle people; they are all kind,
obliging and gladly give all infor-
mation asked for and prices are no high-
er than before the fair and in fact
cheaper than in Portland. A good
meal anywhere for 25 cents. New
brick hotel two blocks from Fair
Grounds, clean neat, bath and all
modern conveniences; all outer rooms
for \$1.00 per night, any Salem citi-
zen going there would gladly give
directions. All car lines circulate at
the New Depot and go in every direc-
tion.

"Those wishing to invest can get
lots quite away out on 4th Avenue
for the modest sum of \$2,500.00 and
\$3,000.00 per front foot, so if you
have any surplus fund you can pos-
sibly use them to advantage. A 36-
story building will be built quite a
way out, hard surface pavement and
cement curbing extend in all direc-
tions for fully eight miles. At the
fair grounds every street, path or
walk of any kind is of hard surface
bituminous pavement, cement curbs
and kept scrupulously clean. All
