TREASURER GOES TO CITY HALL

Will Become License Collector and Made Independent of all Banks.

The ordinance committee (Moore, Eldridge and Moffitt) reported favorably on the Greenbaum ordinance fixing the salary of the city treasurer at \$50 per month, placing his office in the city hall, and making him city license collector.

What This Ordinance Means.

This is one of four ordinances, all tending to place the office of city treasurer on a better business basis, and make it produce revenues. An ordinance already passed declares the three banks public depositories for city funds, and if they accept the funds of the city they are to pay two per cent on daily balances. This is the general custom in cities, and if that ordinance had been in force for the past six months, when from \$20,000 to \$40,000 have been lying in the city banks, the interest would have paid twice what the treasurer's office has cost. Under the new ordinance the treasurer will be furnished a bond by the city, and be made independent to handle the city funds from the standpoint of the city deriving all the revenue possible.

Bank Cannot Be Treasurer.

Mr. Moore, in reporting the bill, said one bank had offered to do all the work for the city free of expense, for what it could make out of the city funds. One bank was doing that for the State Agricultural Society, and handled all the state fair funds without expense to the state. The mayor ruled that, under the charter, a corporation could not be city treasurer, as the people were required to elect a treasurer. If a bank could afford to hire a man to keep the city treasurer's books, and attend to all the city's business for the use of the funds, as many thousands of dollars of those funds were unused from one end of the year to the other, such as improvement funds to pay off bonds that were not mature, After full discussion the ordinance was unanimously passed.

TRAFFIC DELAYED BY FLOODED TUNNEL

(United Press Leased Wire.) Grand Junction, Colo., June 22.—Traffic on the Denver and Rio Grande railroad is blocked because of a flooded tunnel at Tunnel Station, 22 miles east of this city. Two trains are tied up and it is impossible to state how long they will be held. The floor of the tunnel, which is a quarter of a mile long, is under a foot of water, and the tracks at other points are in danger of being washed away.

Redondo, Cal., June 22.—After killing every member of his large flock of turkeys and prize White Leghorn chickens, and examining their craws in the hope of recovering a \$350 diamond he lost, William Cronin has come to the conclusion that one of the sea gulls that frequent the beach near his home gulped the gem, and sailed away to the coast of Honduras.
 After mowing his lawn yesterday morning, Cronin found that the gem was missing from his ring. Immediately he had every inch of the lawn raked with combs and sifted the loose soil. It was not found.
 A neighbor suggested that possibly a foraging hen had had picked up the diamond, which led to the summary execution of the Cronin hen flock. Still the valuable diamond is missing, and the theory was advanced that one of the hundreds of gulls that frequent that section of the beach had been attracted by the sparkler, and had claimed it for its own. Cronin has not given up the search.
