A FINE WATCH FOR LEE

THE SCHOOL BOARD SHOWS ESTEEM FOR RETIRING CHAIRMAN

The city school directors held a
special meeting in the high school
last night for the purpose of trans-
acting unfinished business and also
to swear in the newly-elected direc-
tor, U. G. Holt.

After the official count of the
votes was read by Clerk Johnson,
Andrew A. Lee, the director who re-
tired from the board last night after
serving five years with the most
flattering results to himself and the
public, made a short address. Mr.
Lee said he left the office of school
director with the kindest apprecia-
tion and regard for his fellow offi-
cers, and that during his time on
the board the members had made the
work a pleasure by being always
prepared to work together. If any
little disagreement arose between
himself and another director con-
cerning the school work, the matter
was settled with few words and with
full harmony. He thanked his fel-
low directors for their kindness to-
wards him and his esteem for his
co workers during his time on the
board was fully demonstrated by his
talk. Mr. Lee then swore in the
new director, U. G. Holt, and turned
the office of chairman of the board
over to the next oldest member, Dr.
H. C. Eppley, who proceeded with
the business, but not before he paid
a high tribute to Mr. Lee. Dr. Epp-
ley congratulated Mr. Lee on his
work while a member of the board
and for the persistent manner in
which he fulfilled his many duties
while in office. He said that he
fully appreciated his own incompe-
tency to fill the office of chairman
as well as Mr. Lee had done, but he
would endeavor to try his best and
that he was sorry to see Mr. Lee
leave the board, for it would not
only mean the loss of a valuable
member in building up the Salem
schools, but the many friendly and

enjoyable times they had together
during the meetings would be mis-
sued greatly. Mr. Eppley then, as a
token of friendship and apprecia-
tion from himself and the other
members of the board, presented to
the retiring director a beautiful gold
watch, with A. A. L. engraved on
its case. The time piece is an el-
egant one and the board could not
or have selected a more appropriate
or valuable remembrance. Notwith-
standing Mr. Lee's usual calm man-
ner and composure, the sudden pre-
senting of the pretty gift from his
friends overwhelmed him with
gratitude. It was some minutes
before he could control his emotions,
but after making two attempts to in-
some way express his appreciation
he said the present came to him as
a great surprise; that the members
of the board have his kindest re-
gards and that he thanked them
and appreciated their gift more than
he could tell, but he appreciated the
kindly hearts and warm friendship
that prompted the gift beyond all
price. When Mr. Lee sat down the
board cheered him and it could be
noticed that the kind-hearted school
official's eyes were swimming in
tears.

The meeting then took up its reg-
ular business. Dr. Eppley, as chair-
man of the board, appointed the
standing committees as follows:
Supplies—Babcock and Moores.
Repairs—Moores and Holt.
Finance—Millard and Babcock.
Insurance—Holt and Millard.
Building—Babcock, chairman;
Moores and Millard.
Miss Shaw was appointed as sew-
ing instructor.
The matter of assistant drawing
teacher was also brought up and
Prof. Powers and Scriber were
selected to find a suitable one for the
position.
The board adjourned to next Mon-
day evening, at which time the mat-
ter of supplies for the coming year
will be taken up.
