The rate has changed since the wool shipment was made and it is now necessary for the railroad company to get permission from the railroad commission in order to make the refund.

U'ren Files a Kick—The railroad commission received a communication in the way of a complaint this morning from William S. U'ren of Oregon City, in which it is stated that the accommodations furnished in the baggage department of the union depot in Portland are very unsatisfactory. Mr. U'ren claims that he is a regular patron of the union depot in Portland and that the least time he has been compelled to wait to get his baggage checked was 15 minutes and oftentimes it was from 30 to 50 minutes before he would ever be noticed, and that he has seen other victims of the outrageous neglect besides himself compelled to wait. The complainant does not lay the blame on the employees, however, as he says in his communication that the system is trying to make one man do three men's work, and that the employees now in the baggage department were working all the time he noticed them.

For Selling Liquor—Marshal Henry Smith of Stayton came down this morning bringing Chas. Thompson, who was convicted in Stayton yesterday of selling liquor contrary to the local option laws. Thompson came to Salem after had learned of his probable arrest for selling liquor, but when Marshal Smith was in the city yesterday looking after business matters he saw Thompson crossing State street and arrested him. He was taken back to Stayton and Justice of the Peace J. B. Grier fined him \$50 and costs. Thompson did not have the required fine this morning and Marshal Smith brought him to this city, where he was locked up in the county jail. Unless he can liquidate, a jail sentence of 25 days will have to be served.

Sues for Damages—Suit has been started in the circuit court by G. J. Moore against Lachmund & Pincus, hop merchants, to recover \$1486 damages alleged to be due as the result of an injunction being drawn up against him prohibiting him from selling 15,000 pounds of the 1906 crop. The complaint alleges that the defendants in the suit started injunction proceedings against him which were upheld by a decision of the circuit court in which the case was tried, but upon an appeal to the supreme court the injunction was overruled and the lower court's judgment reversed and that during the time in which the suit was pending the value of the hops was reduced. G. G. Bingham appears as counsel for the plaintiff.
