**PORTLAND PAPERS HAVE KIND WORDS FOR CAPITAL CITY**

**JOURNAL HAS FINE EDITORIAL ABOUT SALEM AND ORGONIAN GIVES MEED OF PRAISE IN EDITORIAL ABOUT STATE**

Under the title "The Coming Salem" the Portland Journal of June 20th says:

The improvement microbe has become active in Salem. Whether Senator Killeher's scheme for removal of the capital had anything to do with it or not, the capital city is throwing off its old clothes. It has done more within a year or two in the way of city beautification than in a decade before. From any vantage point near the university looking west, State street presents a glare of electrical illumination that discounts the best lighted street in Portland.

There are other streets in the city that are brilliantly illuminated. More important still, many of the main thoroughfares have been paved and the step made to that extent from provincialism to the metropolitan. Many of the ancient structures of the primitive Salem have been torn away and are replaced with new ones of modern outline. A splendid five-story building of steel frame and latest architecture is in course of erection, and will give the city a claim to the skyscraper class.

What is better, however, is that virile young business men with large public purpose are pushing to the front with a demand that Salem shall keep pace with the march of events. It is a character of leadership that works out city destiny. It brushes aside the outworn methods and customs of the dim and distant past, and vitalizes the forces of advancement.

Salem is a city of magnificent possibilities. It is in the heart of a region of unsurpassed fertility. Five thousand acres of prune orchards are within a few miles with land values at \$300 per acre. Two hundred carloads of dried prunes annually is the product of this single district, and there are, in the same vicinity, other and increasing prune areas. Failure of the crop is so little known that constant additions are being made to the orchards. One grower whose crop yield has been from 74,000 to 92,000 pounds per year for six years, has added until this season 150,000 is to be the yield.

In addition there are cherry orchards that have given Salem the title of the Cherry City, and from which a rich usufruct is realized. These and other assets in hops, grain and kindred products of the soil place the city in a setting of rich possibilities.

Most notable of all, however, is the home life of the city. For 60 years, the town has been an educational center. The influences that have radiated from the university

have been of invaluable effect. The home life is wholesome, and the homes beautiful in outline and environment. The social life is clean, intellectual and desirable. It is a wholesome place for the seat of government, and if the present movement for a greater and more beautiful Salem persists, Oregon will soon have a capital city that will be satisfying to all the state.

And the Oregonian of June 14, in an editorial on the rapid progress of the state, has the following:

Extraordinary industrial activity, coupled with the purpose and spirit of the new development, is reported from all parts of Oregon. The awakening has been slow, but it is here at last. Every one notes the effect of the new life throughout the state.

The towns and cities are taking pride in their appearance, in the improvement of their streets, in better architecture for the new buildings, and in substitution for buildings of old form and construction new, modern tasteful and commodious plans. It is worth not a little to see such towns as Salem and Eugene, Baker City and La Grande at this day, and compare them with the remembered appearance of former times.

Corresponding improvement is noted in the agricultural districts. Irrigation is beginning in many a fertile district in the semi-arid parts of the state.

In other parts clearing of new tracts for cultivation is in progress, and better farming generally. Advantages of under-drainage are becoming better known. The study of soils brings its contribution to result. Improvement of livestock is becoming general. Fruit growing is settling into a scientific system. The timber of Oregon, properly conserved, will forever be a great resource, and transformation of water power into electric will give the state benefits equal to the labor of millions of hands.

The main drawback now is the slowness of railroad extension. In these times no considerable population will go far beyond the reach of railroad service, and very little real development can come to unoccupied districts till the railroad helps to open the way. Oregon has a right to be insistent that the great railway combination that almost wholly controls its territory shall continue its activity and open new sections of the state. We shall get the Tillamook road within a year, but we want the Coos Bay road, and above all, a road into and through Middle Oregon.

**ENGINEER'S \$100,000 HOTEL RAPIDLY GOING UP**

"Has anyone seen a \$100,000 hotel running around loose? It belongs to Salem or Eugene."—Woodburn Independent.

From this it is inferred that nothing is doing in regard to the erection of the new hotel in Eugene. The Independent is very much wrong.
