THE COP LOVED ANOTHER

San Francisco, June 26.—So far as San Francisco is concerned, the status of trial marriages is fixed for all time. That they are contrary to public policy, and that no action for money, based upon the services rendered by the woman, can be maintained by a court, was the gist of a decision given yesterday by Judge Mogan in the case of Margaret McGrath, trial wife of Policeman Charles McGrath.

A happy period of trial marriage between the two was recently broken off by Grush's new-found love for another woman. Miss McGrath demanded the payment of \$150 which she alleged was due in view of an agreement entered into by the pair when the trial was agreed upon. Grush and the new love, who is now his wife, averred that the claim had been settled. It was also stated that the new Mrs. Grush had furnished the \$150 that had sufficed to persuade her to relinquish her claim. The presence of a third woman in the court, who heatedly accused the cop of being "the worst flit on the force," enlivened the proceedings.

THE OLD MAN'S CURE WAS SHARP BUT SURE

Lemon Grove, Cal., June 26.—"If you're not feeling very well, I'll cure you," and with an exclamation on his lips, John Brooks, 75 years old, drew a knife across the throat of Charles Miller, aged 70, cutting deep gashes before bystanders could interfere. Miller grasped his assailant in such a way that prevented Brooks from stabbing himself.

Miller was taken to a surgeon who said he could not live through the day. Brooks is being held at the local jail pending the outcome of Miller's injuries.

SPENT LAST CENT FOR GUN TO KILL HERSELF

PRICE OF WHEAT KEEPS CLIMBING

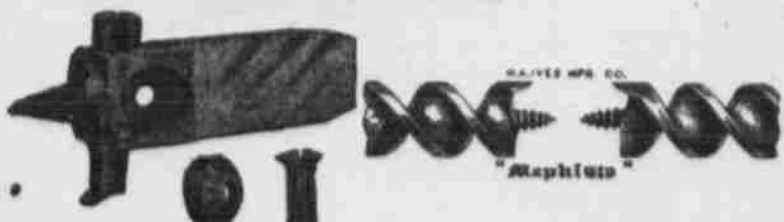

DETECTIVES SEARCH FOR COUNTERFEITERS

Santa Monica, Cal., June 26.—Secret service agents today are working on a clew to a gang of counterfeiters, who have been operating successfully for the last two weeks in Southern California. Spurious currency and plugged gold pieces have been used by the band, and many victims who have reported their losses. Include several veterans of the soldiers' home at Sawtelle.

The latest counterfeit passed is an imitation of a ten-dollar bill of the "Germania" National Bank of San Francisco. It has been learned by the secret service agents that no such bank is in existence. The bill was cleverly made from photographs on paper similar to government scrip, which taking the print, and being tinted, gave a good likeness of genuine currency.

Several twenty-dollar gold pieces have been recovered by the federal agents in Los Angeles and other Southern California cities, which are believed to be the output of a gang working in the interior. The gold pieces were bored, plugged with brass and gilded.

CROSS AND HYLAND THIS AFTERNOON

San Francisco, June 26.—Leach Cross and Dick Hyland, who fight in the Mission street arena this afternoon, weighed in this morning, and neither boy budged the bar, which was set at 133 pounds.

While the boxers were disrobing, Cross made things look equally by badgering Hyland for refusing to bet on himself. The New Yorker sneered at Hyland, telling him that he was afraid to bet, that he had no confidence in himself, and that he made the match merely for the sake of getting the loser's end. Hyland, plainly angered, made no reply, but his manager, Jack Perkins, promptly called Cross, and bet him \$100 at even money.

A heavy Cross play this morning installed the New Yorker favorite at 9 to 10.

CHILDREN BURNED BY EXPLODING LAMP

Los Angeles, June 26.—Because she tried to light an oil lamp with a lighted candle, Annie Vasquez, six years of age, was burned to death last night and her brother is today on the verge of death from burns sustained while he was endeavoring to save her life. Her brother, Peter, fourteen, was able to give an account of the accident between spells of unconsciousness.

The little girl was lighting a lamp when the candle slipped from her hand and the lighted end dropped into the bowl through a vent which had been left open. An explosion followed and the child was covered with blazing oil that ignited her clothing in an instant. The brother hearing her screams rushed to her rescue and was set ablaze. Neighbors ran in, extinguished the flaming clothing and the children were taken to a hospital, where the little girl died.

ENGLAND WILL SEND THREE BIG WARSHIPS

San Francisco, June 26.—Great Britain will send three warships to participate in the international naval pageant at the San Francisco Portola celebration, which begins October 19, according to a cablegram from Charles C. Moore, received today.

Moore is in Europe in the interest of the Portola celebration. The ships that England will send to this port, according to his advice, are the Shearwater, Bedford and Algerine.
