ACCUSED
OF CASTO
MURDER

GEORGE ROBBINS ARRESTED FOR HOOD RIVER CRIME

[United Press Leased Wire.]

Portland, Ore., June 28.—Arrested on a street corner here late yesterday on a warrant, accusing him with murder, George Robbins, whose father's housekeeper, Mrs. Emaline Casto, was killed late Saturday afternoon in the Robbins' home near Hood River, Ore., is today a prisoner in the latter town.

Constable Ganger, of Hood River, and Deputy Sheriff Morse, who traced young Robbins' returned with him on the last train last night, so as to avoid any demonstration at the depot when he arrived. The prisoner refuses to answer questions, preferring to consult a lawyer first. That the murder of Mrs. Casto was premeditated is now the belief of the Hood River county officials. Robbery was the motive.

The woman was killed by a large stone, with which the murderer crushed her skull. Mrs. Casto was working about the house, when William Robbins, her employer, left for town. Upon his return he found his housekeeper dead upon his bed. The fiend had taken from his victim \$50 in cash and a check for \$75.

HASTE OF CREDITORS
DESTROYS EVIDENCE

St. Michaels, Md., June 28.—Haste of the creditors of Robert Eastman, who committed suicide while being pursued for the murder of Mrs. Edith Thompson Woodill, in swooping down upon his bungalow near here and taking possession of his effects has probably prevented the possibility of discovering whether or not any one else was implicated in the death of the Los Angeles automobile dealer's wife.

An attachment was issued to a firm which sold a pump and other articles to Eastman and the sheriff compelled to remove all of these things from the bungalow. This delayed the investigation of the case by the coroner's jury and, it is stated, has rendered it practically impossible to determine the true conditions of the night when Mrs. Woodill met death.

Members of the coroner's jury are indignant over the action of the sheriff and have demanded an investigation. The bungalow was locked up by the sheriff today and no one is permitted to enter it.

CALHOUN TRIAL
COMES UP AGAIN

San Francisco, June 28.—Motion to set aside the indictments against Patrick Calhoun was made today by Stanley Moore, of the trolley magnate's defense forces. The motion was based on the grounds that the grand jury returned the indictments upon the advice of Francis J. Heney, who, at that time, was employed as an assistant to Attorney-General Knox. Under this condition, Moore averred that Heney's appointment as assistant district attorney-general was illegal.

Moore also alleged that Heney received remuneration from a private citizen, Rudolph Spreckels, for services rendered in behalf of the graft prosecution.

Judge Lawlor stated his intention of going into the matter in detail, and will give his decision upon the convening of the court Wednesday.

STOP INVESTIGATION;
DEVLIN HOLDS JOB

Washington, D. C., June 28.—The senate judiciary committee today decided to postpone further consideration of the confirmation of the reappointment of Robert Devlin as United States district attorney at San Francisco, until next session of congress. In the meantime Devlin will hold his office.

The committee was prevented from making a thorough investigation of the case because of Attorney-General Wickersham's refusal to transmit to it certain confidential papers connected with Devlin's prosecution of the Perrin land fraud case.

MAKING IT WARM
FOR ABDUL HAMID

Constantinople, June 28.—The latest claim filed against ex-Sultan Abdul Hamid, many of whose former subjects are demanding indemnity from him for injuries alleged to have been suffered at his hands, was today laid before the government by Ali Haider Midhat Pasha, son of the unfortunate Midhat Pasha who framed the Turkish constitution of 33 years ago and was subsequently killed, the son charges, at Abdul's order.

The deposed ruler is understood to be anxious to prevent the revelations which must be made if the younger Midhat's case is pushed.

His counsel is reported to have made liberal offers for a settlement but the general impression is that the complainant will prefer revenge to financial compensation, which he is unlikely to get if he refuses Abdul's terms, the ex-sultan having concealed the remnants of his finances so cleverly that his enemies cannot find them, and that full publicity cannot be avoided.

Midhat, the elder, was exiled after Abdul had suspended the constitution and died in captivity, unquestionably by poison, which there is small doubt Abdul had administered. His memory is still revered by the liberal element throughout Turkey and definite proof that Abdul had him killed will be likely to be attended by extremely serious consequences for the latter.

BRANDENBURG TRIAL
IS NEARLY ENDED

New York, June 28.—The trial of Broughton Brandenburg, author and novelist, accused of second-degree larceny, in connection with the sale to the New York Times of an article he represented was signed by Grover Cleveland, is drawing to a close today.

After George E. Heming had testified that on June 4 he saw an article substantially like the one which appeared in the Times, and he believed it was signed by Cleveland, the defense rested.

The prosecution then called a few witnesses in rebuttal. It is thought that the case will be terminated shortly.

Mrs. Grover Cleveland was called to the stand to rebut testimony introduced by the defense to throw doubt upon the signature introduced in court as the one affixed to Brandenburg's article. She said the signature was the same.

WOMAN
KILLED
HUSBAND

BECAUSE OF INFATUATION WITH A FARM HAND

Mankato, Minn., June 28.—Charged with the murder of her husband, who, it is alleged, stood in the way of her love for Frank Smith, a farm

hand, Mrs. H. J. Ledbetter, wife of a wealthy farmer who lived near this city, was arrested today. Smith, who is alleged to have had a hand in the crime, is held under the same charge.

Ledbetter has been missing from his home since May 4. Sunday his dead body was found in a shallow grave on the farm. The head was crushed to a shapeless mass, apparently by a blow from a blunt instrument. During his examination by the county authorities today, Smith is alleged to have stated that Mrs. Ledbetter murdered her husband in cold blood because of a blind infatuation for him. He claimed that the attack was made with a heavy axe.

After the examination of Mrs. Ledbetter and Smith, the police arrested William Schwant and his wife, the woman's sister. Schwant was charged with helping to remove Ledbetter's body from a temporary grave to the place where it was found Sunday.

Ledbetter was a resident of this vicinity for years and was prominent in county affairs. Smith had been in his employ for several months.

KILLED
HUSBAND'S
SLAYER

New York, June 28.—Driven to desperation by the thought of her baby starving, Mrs. Louisa Versagia, a pretty widow 25 years of age, today shot and mortally wounded Dominico Versagia, whom she accused of murdering her husband a year ago. The shooting took place on the street today and was witnessed by 1000 factory employees who were on their way to work.

Versagia, who is a 19-year-old youth, was shot four times by the infuriated woman, who was prevented by a bystander from firing another bullet into her victim's prostrate body.

other bullet into her victim's prostrate body.

When the woman encountered Versagia this morning she drew a revolver from under her apron and flourished it in the face of the youth. Versagia reached for his hip pocket as though to draw a revolver but the woman was quicker than he and he fell to the pavement, a bullet hole through his abdomen. The second bullet penetrated the youth's side, the third his back and the fourth his left hand.

Mrs. Versagia made no attempt to escape. She surrendered herself to the authorities without resistance and told her story very calmly. She said that her husband was the victim of the Black Hand that he was killed by Versagia. She was left penniless and her child is now on the verge of starvation. She said she was glad she shot Versagia and hoped he would die.

Versagia was removed to a hospital, where the physicians are making efforts to save his life. There is little chance for his recovery and surgeons believe that his death is but a matter of hours.
