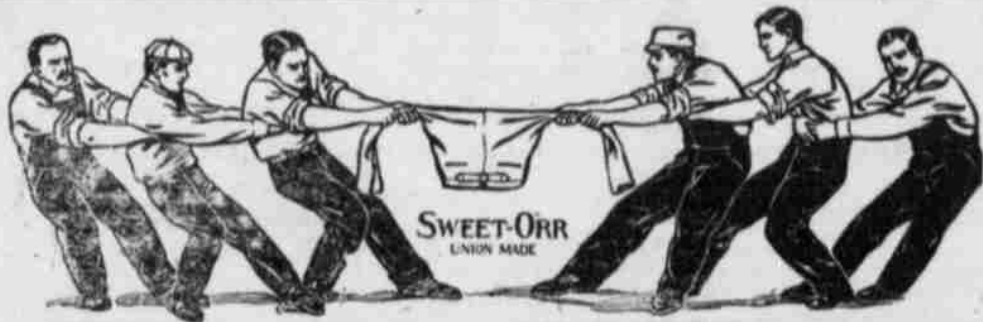

THE CALL ATTACKS PHELAN

mayor. John D. Spreckels, Jr., said: "I am satisfied that the article in this morning's Call was without my father's knowledge."

"What the Call's article said this morning meets with my views. I do not believe that my father knew anything of the article before its publication, but if what is stated therein is true then he will certainly not go back on it or support men of that calibre."

"To the question asked whether or not the Call had been loyal and favorable to Phelan in the past, Spreckels said that, as his memory served him, he remembers that the Call had an article once charging James D. Phelan with a felony, and if he got his just punishment he would be wearing stripes in San Quentin, and this is also my own opinion in every respect," added Spreckels.

"Inasmuch as Rudolph Spreckels' private secretary was in the room where the postage stamps were destroyed—according to the Call's story—it seems to me that my uncle could not have been wholly unaware of what was going on in Phelan's political headquarters."

"I am positive that the Call will not support any particular person or organization whose aims are not directed by unselfish motives, and I am quite satisfied that the Call will certainly not support Phelan for mayor."

had it ever thought of doing so. Personally I can say that he will never get my vote or endorsement.

"I am certain and positive that my father will stand behind everything the Call's story stated or implied, to the fullest limit."

"As long as the graft prosecution acts honorably, and carries out its intentions, the Call will stand behind, when it goes beyond its province, however, and becomes a political tool, I hardly believe my father will give it his support in that endeavor."

"The exposure of Phelan's postage stamp methods will certainly knock the bottom out of the Good Government League, and if it does not, it ought to."

"When asked if it were true that further dictating the policy of the paper regarding the pro-graft prosecution would be changed, Spreckels replied:

"Well, I don't know that, but whatever it may be, I know that the managing editor is working under my father's instructions, and the article of this morning is most assuredly not an accident."

At Phelan's home it was stated today that he had gone to the country, and would not be back until tomorrow.

May Quit Backing Heney.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 28.—"Whenever there is a sudden change in the policy of the Call, it is not done blindly, and there is never a quick change made on my paper, unless there is some corking good reason for it," declared John D. Spreckels,

proprietor of the San Francisco daily as he left a Santa Fe train this afternoon, preparatory to taking a few hours' rest before departing for San Francisco.

On specific points of the Call's sudden change of front, Spreckels was non-communative. From his manner, however, it could be judged that he was eager for any news of later developments in the San Francisco political arena.

Spreckels refused to say whether or not the Call would begin an aggressive campaign upon the San Francisco Bulletin, regarded by many as the organ of the James D. Phelan political campaign, or whether the call intended to follow up apparent double dealing by men with whom his brother, Rudolph, is remotely associated.

Spreckels refused adroitly to discuss the probabilities of the Call withdrawing its support from the graft prosecution of the northern city or whether the paper would continue to support the prosecution with which Rudolph Spreckels is associated, and at the same time oppose men endorsed practically by Rudolph Spreckels.

KAISER

MAKES

A SLIP

Berlin, June 28.—Diplomats are gossiping over another of the Kaiser's indiscretions, from which, however Prince Buelow succeeded in extracting him without letting the masses of Germans know anything had gone wrong.

It was during His Majesty's recent visit to Corfu that the mishap occurred. The Turko-Greek dispute over the ownership of the island of Crete had not assumed the proportions of a crisis at that time, it was already causing friction between the two governments, and it was evident when the moment arrived for settlement.

King George of Greece accordingly sought German support, and the Kaiser, who is the Greek crown prince's brother-in-law, promised it. He kept his word, so far as pleading the Greek cause at Vienna and Rome was concerned, but when he got back to Berlin, Chancellor Buelow, horrified, pointed out to him that such a course would hopelessly compromise Germany's interest in Turkey. So Wilhelm dropped his Greek campaign as quickly as he could, completely stultifying himself with Kaiser Franz Josef and King Victor, and deeply offending King George.

So far as Germany is concerned, to save the Kaiser's face as far as possible, the matter is being allowed to drift. If matters come to an issue, however, the fatherland, which has little to gain from Greece, and a great deal from Turkey, will probably take the latter's side.

the night a dispute arose. According to the story told by the students, Robinson drew a short club which he carried, and was the aggressor in the fight that followed.

After a lengthy struggle, during which all three men were injured seriously, Robinson fell unconscious to the floor. Clark and Shipley bathed their own wounds, and failing to revive Robinson, telephoned to the Colorado railroad depot at Manitou telling of the fight.

Sheriff George Birdsall, accompanied by a physician and several deputies, boarded a special train and made the run to the summit in the record

time of one hour. The wounds of the three men were dressed and the return trip was made.

The two college men are apparently broken-hearted over the affair. They assert Robinson was injured while they were defending themselves from his attack, and they have asked that they be kept posted as to his condition.

Robinson has not recovered consciousness and it is impossible to get his version of the affair. Clark and Shipley will be held without the filing of specific charges, pending the result of Robinson's injuries.
